ORDER OF ADMIRAL BERKELEY. By the hon. George Cranfield Berkeley, vice-admin of the white, and commander in chief of his ra jesty's ships and vessels employed in the river & Lawrence, along the coast of Nova-Scotin, the Islands of St. John and Cape Breton, the Bay of Funday, and at and about the island of Bernet or Summers' Islands.

WHEREAS many feamen, fubjects of his Briang majesty, and in his majesty's ships and vessels, as margin [Belleisle, Bellona, Triumph, Chicheste, He 2d Anne-Arundel. · lifax, Zenobia cutter] while at anchor in the Chel. peake, deferted and entered on board the United States frigate Chesapeake, and openly paraded to ftreets of Norfolk, in fight of their officers, under the American flag, protected by the magistrates of town, and the recruiting officer belonging to above mentioned American frigate, which magiting and naval officer refused giving them up, althout demanded by his Britannic majesty's consul, as well as the captains of the ships from which the said ma had deferted. The captains and commanders of h majesty's ships and vessels under my command, and therefore hereby required and directed, in cale of meeting with the American trigate Chefarette fea, and without the limits of the United State, a thew to the captain of her this order, and to recome to fearch his thip for the deferters from the before mentioned ships, and to proceed and fearch forthe fame; and if a similar demand shall be made by the American, he is to be permitted to fearch for any & ferters from their fervice, according to the culton and usage of civilized nations, on terms of peace at amity with each other. BALTIMORE, July 25.

Arrived, brig American, Houston, 46 days from Malta. Capt. H. informs that the British cruisers in the Mediterranean captured every American vessel they fell in with.

A number of American vessels were to fail from Smyrna and Gallipoli, during the month of June which were expected to be taken and carried into Malta, as it was impossible to escape the privateers in that part of the Mediterranean.

Captain H. informs that about a fortnight before he left Malta, accounts were received of the English having been defeated at some village in the neighbourhood of Alexandria, in Egypt, with the lofs of 1500 killed and wounded. That while at Malta two of the bodies of their generals killed in the action were brought there. It was reported that the British admiral Louis was dead.

The following information was politely handed by eapt. B. Houston, of the brig American.

The American was bound from this port, to Trieffe, a neutral port in the Adriatic, but captured by the English and carried into Malta, and the cargo detained-vessel cleared by giving security to bring proof.

A decifive victory was gained by the forces of Algiers over the troops of the Bey of Tunis, about the Heli of May, in the neighbourhood of Conftantine the news of which occasioned great rejoicing at Ais

Sidi Soliman Mili Mili was at Gibraltar, and part of his bufiness appeared to be the purchasing of milistary stores for his master, one cargo of which he had fent for Tunis.

All the Portuguese squadron that was stationed at Gibraltar, with the exception of a floop of war, one brig and a schooner had gone off Algiers, probably with a view of co-operating with Tunis.

Palermo, 25th May, 1807.

SIR. I have the honour to enclose you herewith for your government, copy of an official notification fent me by H. E. the marquis de Circelle, his Sicilian majesty's minister for foreign affairs, where all the ports of the kingdom of Naples occupied by his majesty's enemies, are declared in a state of blockade.

You will of course do what is needful with the fame for the information of the American flag.

By Mr. James Powers, a passenger in a schr. Funa boat's crew of the British landed on Smith's Island, on Monday last, they took a quantity of poultry, for which they paid; after which they flor the flock of cattle and sheep for which they offered fifty cent per head; but the owner refused receiving it; and they took them without giving any thing. They then proceeded to fink casks for the purpole of obtaining water : and as it is calculated they will land for the water, the militia of the neighbourhood have put themselves [American.] in readiness to receive them.

Admiral Duckworth, in detailing the operations of the British fleet in repassing the Dardanelles, mentions that the mainmast of the Windsor Castle was nearly cut through by a granite shot of eight hundred weight. This appears to have excited doubts in many persons of the possibility of ordinance being cast of fufficient calibre to throw a ball of fuch an immense fize. But in referring to DE TOTT's memoirs (on the fortifications, &c. of the Dardanelles) we find an account of an enormous piece of ordinance which would carry a marble ball of eleven hundred pounds weight. This piece, cast in brass in the reign of Amurath, was composed of two parts, joined toge. ther by a screw, where the charge is contained, after the manner of an English pistol. Its breach rested against a massy stone work; and it was placed upon timbers, cut and disposed for that purpose, under a small arch which served as an embrasure. To load this formidable piece of artillery no less than three hundred and thirty pounds of powder was requiredand the explosion is described as resembling the shock of an earthquake. " At the distance of three hundred fathoms (fays De Tott) I faw the ball divideinto three pieces, and these fragments of a rock crossed the Strait, rebounded from the water to the opposite mountain, and left the furface of the fea all in a foam through the whole breadth of the channel."

DIED, at Martinique, 2d June, Madame DELA-PAGERIE, mother of her majesty the empress and queen of France and Italy, aged 71. Her remains were interred with great pomp, in which all the civil, ecclesiastical and military bodies assisted. On the 17th the funeral service was celebrated throughout the colony on the event.
