Mr. Porter delivers a favourable report on the petition of John Maloy, which was twice read; the resolution therein contained assented to, and sent to the senate.

The bill for the benefit of William Smith, son of Robert Smith, was read the second time, and the question put, Shall the said bill pass? Determined in the negative.

The bill to lay out and open a road in Anne Arundel county, was read the second time, and sent to the senate.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill to make publick a road in Montgomery county, and the bill to authorize the levy court of Harford county to assess and levy a sum money, for the purposes therein mentioned, severally endorsed, "will pass." Ordered engrossed. A bill, entitled, An act to incorporate a company to straighten and turnpike the present post-road from the Delaware line, in Cecil county, to Baltimore city, through Cecil, Harford and Baltimore counties; which was read.

The further additional supplement to the act to provide for the administration of justice in cases of crimes and misdemeanors in the London Phoenix fire company, and other purposes, passed, "will pass;" was read. The resolution disapproving the resolutions of Virginia and Vermont, "the first assented to, and the second from." And the following motion:
