We return you the bill, entitled, An act make valid a deed from Robert Gilla Hampton to William Gilbert, and hope, upon areconsideration, you will pass the said bill. We transmit you herewith the said defective deed, by which it will appear that the purthale movey has been paid by Gilbert to Hampton. We think that this is one of those tiles in which the legislature might with safely, and ought in juffice, to interfere. It is indeed true, that by an application to the chancellor, this defect in faid deed might be remedied, but the great expense of a suit in chancery has hitherto deterred him from an application to that court, as he is a very poor man, and the property conveyed, as will appear by a reference to the deed, is fo finall inquantity, that a fuit in chancery would exhaust more than the value of the land. We cannot discover any impropriety in the interference of the legislature in a case fituated as this is. It has certainly been hitherto the practice of the legislature, in many instances, to make valid defective conveyances, where no objections were made by parties interested, and we can discover no reason why the general affembly should deviate from a practice, which, in cales circumstanced as the present n, cannot but prove falutary to the people of this state.
