Saumarez and Admiral Durnham, with a large fleet, are full lying at Gottenburg. The Swedes are in expectation of our making an attack upon them in one of their ports, with a view to enable their former King, Gustavus, to recover his

" Wingo Sound, June 21. " There is an expectation here that a General Officer is coming out with troops; but for what purpose, I can form no conjecture ; some fay that Carlferona [in Sweden] is the object, but I am afraid that place is much too strong for us. The Defence and Cressy sailed two days ago for the Belt with a large convoy. The Gorgon, which brought the Russian prisoners from Portsmouth, failed at the same time for Revel to land them.
