It is in vain to attempt to impart the idea produced by the advance of the splendid assemblage. The venerable Patriarch of the Christian world slowly proceeds, borne on the shoulders of his guards. Princes of the first distinction support the waving canopy, beneath which he reposes : the march of the bearers is so equal, that the litter seems to float | road. on the wavy surface of the crowd. Pius inclines his awful form toward the altar placed before him, on which is raised the sacrament deposited in the holy vessel, glowing with jewelry. The Pope is at this sime seated, but appears as if kneeling, from the disposition of the robes. Ample folds of white satin, decorated with crowns, embroidered in gold, inclose his person, and stream on the heads of the bearers of the litter, over the whole range of the vehicle, and around the sacred altar itself. His hands and his head, white with the snows of age, are perfectly bare. The motion of his lips indicates the solemnity of silent prayer; his eyes the residue of the sum which still

wards, and all the features of his ountenance conspire to express the nost fervent piety. The magick ffect produced on the multitude, is singular display of congregated celing; at first it produces astonshment; this gradually subsides, and the whole assembly gives way to all the sensibility and humiliation this scene is calculated to inspire. An universal trepidation seizes the spectator when the ap-pearance of the boly Father is announced by the bells and cannon. The pyramidal groupe moves slowy onward, the litter hovers over he multitude, and the people prosrate themselves to the earth, as if he thunder of Zion were heard. They rise, beat their penitent preasts, the tears streaming from their eyes, which are timidly directed towards the eucharist, the keeper of the key of heaven, and the sacred ceremonies he is performing for their admission .- An enthusiasm almost divine, agitates the crowd, the massive gates of heaven seem to be unfolded, and the visions of ecstatick bliss to be disclosed. The Pope afterwards asrends the high altar; and concludes the ceremonies by the solemn forms of apostolick benediction to the people, who wait in holy anxiety to

LONDON PARAGRAPHS.

The latest accounts from India, which are to June 15, announce the termination of hostilities in the northern provinces of Nepaul. After a series of success gained over the Goorkahs, by the British troops under Gen. Ochterlony, a convention was signed, by which Chountra Eumsah, on the part of the Rajah of Nepaul, agrees to evacuate the fort of Almorah, and the province of Kamabon, with all its fortified

The London papers contain accounts from Canton to the 25th o February last, at which time the misunderstanding between the English and the Chinese government wore a serious aspect. It was apprehended that Sir George Staunton would be sent out of the country. The Emperor had issued a threatening edict against the English. We think that later accounts have been received here, at the date of which the difficulties nad subsided.

The Prussian army is disposed of in 4 lines. The first of 30,000 men in France, is commanded by Gen-Kleist. The 2d is to occupy the fortresses. The 3d is to be stationed in the new Prussian posses. sions on the left of the Rhine and commanded by Gen. Gneisseau. The 4th is to be stationed on the right of the Rhine, and to extend its cantonments to Erferth.
