Parcupine's Caricature of the Americans.

From the Virginia Patriot. To show to what friends abroad we are indebted for the degradation of our national character, a few extracts from Cobbett, quoted by the Quarterly Review, are here giv

"Peter Porcupine tells us for instance, of a man who had married a free black woman in the West-Indies, had several children by her; robbed and left her; went to the U. States, married another wife, and with all these blushing honours upon him, was elected to the Senate. -" Happy that nation, says Cob bett [speaking of Mat. Lyon] where there is but one step from the contienmed hole to the Legislature."-"Cobbett states it as 4 notorious fact, that a man imprisoned for an assault upon his wife was forgotten in one of their cells; and when rerollected was found dead, half dewoured by rats,"——Porcupine's Works Vol. 7, "Another man, for a libel on Jefferson, was suffered to die in gaol, because, without conviction, bail to such amount was dehe was not able to procure."-Porcupine's works, vol. 9, p. 318. . Porcupine says that the proceedings of a court were interrupted four stays by the absence of the Chief Justice, who was confined to his house, by a black eye given to him he his wife: that in another court the Judge was so drunk, that, having occasion to retire a little walle. he was led from the bench by two constables, who supported him all the time, and back again to his seat. I had this, says the relater, from a gentleman who was a witness of the scene."-Porc. vol. 9, page 380. "In 1795, the wife of a Judge married an ostler in Philadelphia. His Honour the Judge, 1798, stept into gaol for a few weeks, to take the befound the other husband of his wife engaged in a similar pursuit, and. both came before the court, and were whitewashed together. This same jurge, dering the winter of 1800, being in the lebby of the Sente sto'e one of the members cloaks which was afterwards rectained from off his back, in coming out of a-Presbyterian meeting-house, where the Senator and Judge happened to meet in sympathetic devotion. These facts, says Cobbett, horrid -Porc. vol. 9, page 381. "Once, Cobbett adds, but of curiosity, caused advertisements of this nature [elopements] to be cut out of all the papers I received for one month, and to be pasted close under each other. At the end of the month the slip reached from the ceiling to the floor of a room more than ten feet high, and containing 123 advertisements. We did not receive, at most, more than a twentieth part* of the newspapers published in the United States. If a calculation be made from these facts, it will be found that there were about 25 000 divorces. separations & elopements, in a year-a calculation which. I am certain, is very far within bound."-Porc. vol. 9. page 339.

Volumes of similar falsehoods and misrepresentations has this fellow published against the people of this country, but more particularly against the democrats. Yet most of the democrats hall him as an able assistant in their cause.
