Our Relations with Spain.
The following important Message was transmitted to both Houses of Con & ss, by the President of the United States:

To the House of Representatives of the United States.

I transmit to Congress an extract of a letter from the Minister Pleni-potentiary of the United States at St. Petersburg, of the 1st of Nov. last, on the subject of our relations with Spain, indicating the sentiments of the Emperor of Russia, respecting the non-ratification, by his Casholic Majesty, of the treaty lately concluded between the U. States and Spain, and the strong interest which his Imperial Majesty takes in promoting the ratification of that treaty. Of this friendly disposition, the most satisfactory assurance has been since given directly to this government, by the Minister of Russia residing here.

I transmit also to Congress-an extract of a letter from the Minister Plenipotentiary of the United States at Madrid, of a later date than those heretofore communicated, by which it appears that, at the instance of the Charge des Affaires of the Emperor of Russia, a new pledge had been given by the Spanish government, that the Minister who had been lately appointed to the United States should set out on his mission without delay, with full power to settle all differences in a manner satisfactory to the parties.

I have further to state, that the governments of France and Great Britain continue to manifest the sentiments heretofore communicated, respecting the non-ratification of the treaty by Spain, and to interpose their good offices to promote

its ratification. It is proper to add, that the governments of France and Russia have expressed an earnest desire that the United States would take no step, for the present, on the principle of reprisal, which might possibly tend to disturb the peacy between the United States & Spain There is good cause to presume, from the delicate manner, in which this sentiment has been conveyed that it is founded in a belief & weli as a desire, that our just objects may be accomplished without the hazard of such an extremity.

On full consideration of all these circumstances, I have ahought it my duty to submit to Congress, whether it will not be desirab postpone a decision, on the questions now depending with Spain, until the next session. The distress of that nation at this juncture affords a motive for this torbearance, which cannot fail to be duly appreciated. Under such circumstances, the attention of the Spanish government may be diverted from its foreign concerns, and the arrival of a minister here be longer delayed. am the more indused to suggest this course of proceeding, from a know-ledge that, while we shall thereby make a just return to the powers whose good offices have been acknowledged, and increase, by a new and signal proof of moderation, our claims on Spaine our attitude in regard to her will not be less favoura. ble at the next session than it is at Present. Captain Davis writes as follows to

the Editors of the Salem Gazette.
"With regard to the revolution in Spain, I can give you but little information. The revolutionists, 2000 strong, were hourly expected at Malaga when I left. The Patriots had not possession of Gadiz when I left Gibraltar, but were making preparations to go against the Gostedora, and probably would have possession of it in a very mort time. The Patriots were judged to be 25.000 strong, fine troops, well officered, well clothed and fed, good pay, and every thing they wished for; they are under very strict discipline, and behave with the greatest propriety, and it appears their only object is to establish the Cortes, At Algesiras and St. Roque there was no opposition, and they will meet with none at Malaga; it appears to be well understood between them, and it is generally believed they will gain their point.

From a Gibraltar paper of the 12th ultimo.

"A large body of the Constitutional troops lest this place (St. Roque) a few days since, and are now in Malaga on their way to Grenada. The loyal Governor of Malaga embarked immediately and is now in our bay.

Seven priests are reported to have arrived this morning from that city, ac, Algesiras .-They were so alarmed at the threatening danger, that they gave \$3000 for a small felucca of boat, to bring them where they could throw themselves into the protection of the Royalists."

Extract of a letter from Malaga,

Feb. 16. "Business with us continues very dull. Nothing is doing in imports from the United States, to advantage. A cargo of staves from Boston has been disposed of within a few days, half on barter, and half on a long credit, which will not net the owners \$70 per M. The market is completely overstocked with fish. A cargo, American caught, could notice sold for \$2 75 on board. English fish, which bears a preference of \$1 per quintal higher, is at this moment almost unsaleable.
