We are in the full enjoyment of almost every national blessing—we are not only exempt from the horrors of war, but we are every where blessed with plenty and abundance. Our commerce, our agriculture, and our manu factures are comparatively flourishing—far more so perhaps than in any other quarter of the globe. But above all, the demon of party spirit is now laid, and we trust for

party spirit is now laid, and we trust for the lope, indeed arrived, when the only contest will be, who can do his country most service; and when in appointment to office, the only questions asked will be, Is he ho-nest? It will in future become of State Register. It will in future become the repository of all state documents, and of such other information as may lend to elucidate the history of the state, or proelucidate the history of the state, or promote its improvement and prosperity. It will also be the object of the Editor to present his patrons with the earliest intelligence, foreign or domestic; and he will be partic ilarly careful to devote a due portion of his paper to the interests of Agriculture, Manufactures, and Domestic Economy.—With this statement of his objects and his views, the Editor submits his plan to the patronage of the public—Should it be favoured with their support, will endeavour not to disappoint the expectation that may be excited.




