Although she had not completed her ninth year, her extraordinary intelli-gence, and amiable disposition, endeared her to all who knew her The closing scene of her life was very afficing, and at the same time consolatory, as she evinced such a pious resignation and confidence in God as is seldom met with in riper years Her last breath whispered prayers and be-nedictions for all around her, and anxious longings to be released, that she might be with her God, who she knew would take her as his own child. Blessed spirit! how selfish the regrets we feel for thy dismissal from this world of sorrow! Thou art now enjoying the presence of that Saviour, who graciously said, "Suffer little children to come unto me, for of such is the kingdom of Heaven."
