**MARYLAND**

**BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH**  
Of the late Com. Thomas McDonough.  
Captain Thomas Macdonough was the son of an eminent physician of the same name, who resided in the county of New Castle, in the state of Delaware. He was appointed a Major in the Revolutionary army, in 1775, but retired early from the service. After the peace he held several responsible offices, and died in 1796. He had several children, among whom were three sons. The eldest James, was a merchant under Commodore Truxton when he took the Insurgent, in which action he was so severely wounded to be obliged to have a leg amputated and leave the service. After the death of his father, the lamented subject of this article obtained a merchant's warrant, and commenced his career with many other gallant young men, all ardently desiring opportunity to distinguish themselves. He accompanied our little fleet to the Mediterranean, and was frequently engaged in the conflicts which tested the relative prowess of Christians and Mahometans, in the Tripolitan wars. Though at this time grave, reserved and circumspect in a remarkable degree, we are told (by the Analectic Magazine) he was then remarkable for daring impetuosity, an invincible valour sort of perseverance in every sort of adventure.  
In 1806 he was first Lieutenant on the Siren, then lying in the harbour of Gibraltar, under the late Cap. E. Smith. While here, young Macdonough signaled himself in the absence of the Capt. who was on shore, by being an American seaman who was pressed from one of our merchant lying near the Siren. Macdonough hearing the fact, ordered his boat to be manned and armed, pursued the boat of the pressgang, and rescued the seaman when along side of the British frigate. The Siren, in a great rage, to demand how he dared to take a man from one of his majesty's boats?
