House of Delegates

THURSDAY, January 17, 1838.

Mr. Thomas, of Frederick, presented the memorial and petition of D. H. Bingham, of the city of Frederick, praying to be reimbursed money expended by him, in the repair of the barracks in said city; which was referred to the committee or alking. mittee on claims.

Mr. Wells presented the petition of William Caton, of the city of Annapolis, praying reimbursement of monies paid by him into the treasury. On motion by Mr. Wells, the question was put, Will the house refer said petition to a select committee of five members? And it was determined in the negative. When on motion by Mr. Hughes of Charles, the said petition was referred to the standing committee on claims.

Mr. Steuart, of the city of Baltimore, presented the memorial of sundry citizens of said city, praying for the re-peal of that part of the act of assembly, entitled, An act relating to insolvent debtors in the city and county of Baltimore, which provides for the appointment of three commissioners of insolvent debics, and that the clerk of Baltimore county court may be substituted and authorised to perform certain duties relative to insolvent debtors, instead of said commissioners; which was referred to the committee on grievances and courts of justice.

Mr. Fitzhugh presented the petition of the commissioners appointed by an act of the general assembly of this state, passed at December session 1817, chapter 63 or building a new gaol for Washington county, praying the passage of a law authorising she levy court of said county, to levy on the inhabitants thereof, at their next annual meeting, the sum of fifteen hundred dollars, for the purpose of discharging the expenses incurred by them, as therein mentioned; which was referred to Messrs. Fitzhugh, Rentch and Yates.
