House of Delegates

TUESDAY, March 4, 1828.

The house met. Were present the same members as on resterday.

Mr. Orrell presented the petition of Solomon Richardson, of Caroline county, praying that so much of the public road, therein described, as runs through his farm, may be altered and changed; which was referred to a select com-mittee, consisting of Messrs. Orrell, Jones, and Douglas of

Mr. Thomas of Frederick, presented the petition of James Thompson, of Frederick county, praying, that in consideration of his extreme poverty and advanced age, he may be placed on the out door pension list of the poor of said county; which was referred to the standing committee for the pecuniary relief of indigent persons by county ass

Mr. Ridgaway having asked and obtained leave to introduce a bill, to be entitled, An act to abolish the office of Auditor General, and to require the Examiner General to perform the duties now performed by the said Auditor General; it was, on his motion, Ordered, That a select committee of five members he appointed to prepare and report the same. Messrs. Ridgaway, Thomas of Cecil, M'Mahon, Hope and M'Culloh, were appointed the said committee.

Mr. Fitzhugh from the committee on agriculture, to which was recommitted a bill, reported by Mr. Linthicum, entitled, An act for the protection of sheep, in Anne-Arundel county, and for other purposes, with instructions to report a general bill on that subject, reported a bill in conformity with said instructions, entitled. An act for the protection of sheep in the several counties of this state, and for other purposes; which was read the first time, and ordered

to lie on the table.

On motion by Mr. Teackle, the house proceeded to consider the bill, reported by him, from the committee on ways and means, entitled, An act for the benefit of the American Colonization Society; and, in the progress of the second

On notion by Mr. Teackle, the second section of said bill was amended by striking out the word, "benefit," in the 7th line of that section, and inserting in lieu thereof, the word, "colonization."

On motion by Mr. Thomas, of Saint-Mary's, the third section of said bill was also amended, by striking out the words, "the delivery of," where they occur in the 7th and 8th lines, and also in the 13th line, of that section, and by inserting after the word, "manufactures," where it occurs in the 5th and 14th lines, of said section, the words, "or the proceeds

on motion by Mr. Banning, it was Ordered. That the governor and council be respectfully requested to furnish to this house all the information they possess regarding what steps have been taken against the late registers in chancery, their representatives or securities, to secure the amount of the costs of completing the unrecorded chancers papers, and the probability of any portion of the same being secured, either from the repre-sentatives of said registers or from their securities. The committee on internal improvement, to whom was referred the communication of the state of Maine submitting to the consideration of this general assembly a resolution passed by the legislature of that state, in relation to the funds which the government of the United States may appropriate to the purpose of internal improvement, beg leave most respecifully to report—That the people and government of Maryland have repeatedly expressed their opinion in favour of such appropriations being made by congres, in terms which concede that power, and advise its exercise; and therefore, since the state of Maine has chosen to waive this question of right, and preferred, on the present occasion, to advert exclusively to the practical exercise of this great power, your committee believe that this general assembly should merely repeat the declaration of the perfect confidence which the people of Maryland are pleased to repose in the justice and wisdom of congress, who are by the constitution not only authorised, but required, to appropriate the national funds to the promotion of the general welfare; and we accordingly recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

1st. Resolved by the General Assembly of Mary'and, That the congress of the United States possess full power and authority, under the constitution, to appropriate the national funds, to such objects of internal improvement, as in their opinion reary promote the common good and general welfare; and that the people and government of this state, adhering to their settled policy, look with e-tire confidence to the justice and wisdom of that enlightened body, for the most beneficial exercise of this important and necessary pow-

2d. Resolved, That the governor and executive council of this state, be and they are hereby requested, to transmit a copy of these resolves, with the preamble, to the executive the several states in this union.
