Gentlemen of the Senate,

We have learned with regret, that your honourable body have rejected the bill, entitled, An act for the general valuation and assessment of property in this state, adopted by this body, and recommended by a committee of conference raised at your request.

We are not conscious that any objectionable provision exists in the details of that bill, which would justify its rejection, and as we consider the principles laid down for the government of this legislature, in the 13th section of the bill of rights, which declares, "that every person in this state ought to contribute his portion of public taxes for the support of government, according to his actual worth in real or personal property, within this state," the basis of this bill, and believe its passage to be neces ary to provide the means of defraying the expenses of government, we respectfully request your honourable body to reconsider the said bill, in the hope that you may waive your objections to any details therein, since we feel it to be our duty to adhere to the basis thereof, and cannot think it wise or expedient to horrow money to meet

the ordinary expenses of government.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates, We have received your message, requesting a reconsideation of the bill, entitled, An act for the general valuation and assessment of property in this state, and are compelled to return it to your honourable body without gratifying your request, as there has been no change in the opinion formed by the members of the senate, in relation to the principle, and details of the bill.

On metion by Mr. Semmes, the house proceeded to conider the resolution, submitted by him on the sixth instant, from the committee on ways and means, authorising the name, on the credit, and for the use of the state, for the service of the current year. And the same having been read

Mr. Semmes moved. That the firther consideration of the aid resolution be referred to the next general assembly? After considerable debate, the question thereon was propounded. And resolved in the affirmative—yeas 40, nays

Mr. McMahon, offered the following preamble and resoution for consideration:

Whereas this house of delegates has, at its present session, passed a bill to assess and levy taxes in conformity with the rule prescribed by the bill of rights, which declares that taxes shall be levied for the support of government on all persons within this state, according to their actual worth in real and personal property: And whereas the said bill was prepared with care and deliberation by the committee of ways and means of this house, in conformity to this rule, and was afterwards amended by a committee of conference from both branches of the legislature, and raised at the request of the senate, for the avowed purpose of amending the same: And whereas that body has subsequently rejected the said bill, and has moreover refused to inform this house whether their objections are to the principle of taxation embodied in it, or to its details, or to the grand system of internal improvement by means of rail roads and canals intended to be promoted thereby: And whereas any money which this legislature might authorize the treasurer to borrow, must ultimately be repaid out of taxes hereafter to be levied upon the people of this state, and most probably upon the partial and oppressive principles which animated the systems of direct taxation heretofore resorted to by this state as mere expedients.

Therefore, we, the immediate representatives of the peo-ple, solemnly resolve and declare, that we cannot, with due hereby authorised and required, to procure and present to Lieutenant Isaac Mayo a sword, in testimony of the high sense of approbation the legislature entertain of his gallast

time providing an adequate security for the repayment of the same, based upon a system of taxation conforming to the rule of taxation indicated by the bill of rights.

Which were twice read, when Mr. Boon proposed to amend the said preamble by inserting immediately after the words, "whether their objections are to the principle of taxation embodied in it, or to its details," in the 21st line thereof, the following words, viz. "or to the grand system of internal improvement, by means of rail roads and canals, intended to be promoted thereby."

And the question being taken on agreeing to the amendment proposed, it was determined in the negative.

Thomas of Frederick, then submitted the following preamble and resolution, as substitutes for those offered by Mr. M'Mahon:

Whereas, the bill of rights declares, that taxes ought to be levied on the citizens of this state, in proportion to their actual wealth. Whereas, the bill passed by this house, entitled, An act for the general valuation and assessment of property in this state, and rejected by the senate, contains in its de-tails, arbitrary and inquisitorial provisions; And, whereas, this house entertains the opinion, that other modes might be resorted to, to meet the current expenses of this government, less oppressive in their immediate or remote effects on the community, having immediate regard to the declaration of ights, which declares, "That taxes should be levied for the support of government, on all persons within this state, according to their actual worth in real and personal property," and more especially extending its blessings and burt qually to the mercantile, mechanical and agricultural inte-

Resolved, That this house cordially approve the rejection, by the co-ordinate branch of the legislature, of the bill entitled, An act for the general valuation and assessment of property in this state, defective as it is in detail, and recommend that said bill be published, under the direction of the executive, in the several newspapers in this state, for three successive weeks, after the first day of Max next, to afford an opportunity to the citizens generally, to form an opinion on the propriety of this new and important system of trvation; and that the executive be, and they are hereby authorized. gised, to draw on the treasurer of the western shore, for such sum of money as may be necessary to defray the expenses of the publication authorised by this resolution.
