**BIBLE CONVENTION FOR THE STATE
OF MARYLAND.**

The following is a copy of a Circular
being addressed to the Reverend Clergy of
Baltimore, March 2d, 1835.

Reverend and Dear Sir:

The Young Men's Bible Society of this
city, in connexion with other Societies, has
recently commenced a second time to supply
deserted families in our state with the
Bible. In the general supply of the state a
few years since, there was often found a
want of system in our operations; in con-
sequence of which the work was not as
thoroughly accomplished in all cases as
could have been desired. Having learned
something from the past, we are of opinion,
with a little timely attention and exertion,
the errors of former inexperience may not
be avoided in the present undertaking, by
a system devised which will insure a
permanent supply of the Sacred Scrip-
tures hereafter to every destitute house-
hold in our state.

In view of this contemplated re-supply
has been thought by some of the friends
of the cause here, that it would be ex-
tremely advantageous to establish such uniform
of operations throughout the state as will
secure the harmonious and efficient co-
operation of ALL. For this purpose it has been
suggested that a BIBLE CONVENTION FOR
THE STATE OF MARYLAND be held in the
city of Baltimore on the first day of May
next, to which every Christian congregation
and Bible Society in the state, and that
of the District of Columbia lying north of
Potomac, shall be invited to send one or
more delegates, without regard to age, as
neither expected nor desired that the
should devote exclusively upon the
men of Maryland. The Society we re-
present is but the organ of this call upon our brethren
throughout the state, and we hope it will
heartily respond to by those of every
age and condition in life. When infidelity
boldly shows its hideous front, and sub-
verts among us in open day, or its more
subtle, but not less dangerous, art, attempts
to subvert those precious articles of our
faith which are alike the refuge of the
and the consolation of the saintly surely
should the Christians of America take the
alarm in time, and make and keep their
land of Bibles.

Many important suggestions are expected
to claim the serious attention of the Con-
vention, and its proceedings cannot fail, we
think, to be regarded with no ordinary interest.
It will prove a salutary example to the
states of our confederacy, and by the Divine
blessing must give a powerful impulse to
the Bible cause throughout the Union. It is
believed that it will be numerously and ably
attended, affording gratifying evidence in
brethren abroad how much the Christians
of Maryland love the truth and simplicity of
the Bible, and how deep is the anxiety they
feel that others may possess the heavenly boon.
We feel assured that no Bible Society or
congregation of Christians within its borders
can consent to remain unrepresented in a
body assembled for the avowed and only
of consulting upon the great inter-
man's salvation in the wide dissemination
of the Sacred Scriptures. Let us then meet
the name of our common Lord and Saviour
and amidst the cordial interchange of
friendly greetings, present to our country
the world a spectacle so solemn, so sub-
lime, and so instructive, as that of an assembly
of Christians, of every sect and denomina-
tion, sacrificing for a season their differ-
ence of opinion at the foot of the Cross, to the
celebration of the BIBLE, without note or
comment, their holy bond of union.

It is respectfully requested that this
be submitted to the congregation under
pastoral charge, who are hereby invited to
select one or more lay delegates to the pro-
posed convention as early as convenient. It
will oblige us by immediately communicating
the result to our Corresponding Secretary,
in behalf of the Young Men's Bible So-
ciety of Baltimore, who have the honor to
