William Rothwell, Adm'r. of John R. Fran-  
cis.

The object of the bill filed in this cause is  
to obtain a decree to permit the com-  
plainant to redeem the negroes hereinafter  
mentioned, and that the defendant reconvey  
and reassign to complainant the said negroes,  
and that the defendant account for the hire,  
wages and value, of the services of said ne-  
groes.

The bill states, that three judgments were  
rendered against the complainant in Cecil  
County Court, and writs of fieri facias issued  
thereon, and three negroes, to wit—two ne-  
gro men and one negro woman, the prop-  
erty of complainant, amongst things seized  
and advertised for sale by the sheriff of  
Cecil county to satisfy said judgments—  
That complainant applied to a certain John  
R. Francis to lend him money to pay said  
judgments, or to attend the sale, and pur-  
chase said negroes for complainant, and hold  
the same, and receive the hire, wages and  
services, of the same, until he said Francis  
had been repaid the price for which he should  
purchase them, with interest—That said  
Francis did agree with complainant that he  
would attend the sale of said negroes under  
said executions, and would purchase said  
negroes for complainant, and hold the same  
until he was repaid their price, with interest,  
and out of their hire, wages or services, and as  
soon as he was repaid he would return and  
restore said negroes to complainant—That  
said Francis attended said sale, and stated  
and proclaimed to sundry persons who were  
present for the purpose of bidding for said  
negroes, that he the said Francis was bid-  
ding for said negroes for the benefit of com-  
plainant, and that he intended and had ag-  
reed to return them to the complainant as  
soon as he Francis was repaid, in conse-  
quence of which declaration the persons who  
attended the sale for the purpose of purchas-  
ing said negroes refused to bid, and said  
negroes were struck off to said Francis for  
the small sum of one hundred and fifty dol-  
lars, and said negroes were then and there  
delivered to said Francis, whereas the sum of  
negroes were worth a much greater sum of  
money, and under other circumstances—that  
said Francis departed this life intestate, in  
1836, and letters of administration on his  
personal estate were granted to the defend-  
ant, William Rothwell, who undertook the  
execution of said trust, and has included the  
said negroes as the property of the said Fran-  
cis, in the inventory which he has returned,  
and that said negroes are still so held, and  
possessed by said Rothwell, as administrator  
aforesaid—That said Francis did receive the  
wages of the two negro men for the year  
1834, which amounted to one hundred dol-  
lars, and that he ever afterwards, up to his  
death, received the wages, hire, or services,  
of the said men and woman, which were re-  
asonably worth one hundred and twenty-five  
dollars per annum, over and above all charge  
for clothing and food, and that since his  
death the same have been received by said  
Rothwell as his administrator—that the whole  
amount and value of the said hire, wages, or  
services of said negroes, greatly exceed the  
sum or price paid for said negroes, together  
with the interest that has accrued thereon,  
and that according to said agreement com-  
plainant is entitled to have and repossess  
said negroes—That complainant demanded  
said negroes from said Francis in his life-  
time, and since his death from said Rothwell,  
the administrator aforesaid, but that said  
Francis in his lifetime, and said Rothwell  
since the death of said Francis, wholly ne-  
glected and refused to deliver up said ne-  
groes to the complainant. The bill also  
states, that said William Rothwell re-  
sides out of the state of Maryland.

It is thereupon Ordered, That the com-  
plainant by causing a copy of this order to  
be published in some newspaper once in each  
of three successive weeks before the 19th  
day of February next, give notice to the said  
nonresident defendant of the substance and  
object of the bill, that he may be warned to  
appear in this court in person, or by a soli-  
citor, on or before the 12th day of June next,  
to show cause, if any he hath, why a decree  
should not be passed as prayed.

## JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

Of the House of Delegates of the  
State of Maryland.

DECEMBER SESSION, 1837.

**WEDNESDAY, January 24th.**

Mr. Swingley presented a petition of sundry  
citizens of the seventh election district of Wash-  
ington county, praying that the act of last ses-  
sion, chapter 148, relative to a new election dis-  
trict, may not be confirmed.

Mr. Swingley, a petition of Michael Seib-  
ert and others, of Washington county, praying  
the passage of an act, authorising the Botani-  
cal or Thompsonian system of medical practice to  
be used and administered by persons not  
members of the Medical Faculty.

Mr. Rentsch, a petition of sundry citizens  
of the seventh election district of Washington  
county, praying the confirmation of an act of  
last session, chapter 148, relative to a new elec-  
tion district.

Mr. Ford, a petition of Thomas H. Miles, of  
Saint Mary's county, praying the passage of an  
act to authorise the levy court of said county to  
increase his salary as clerk thereof.

Mr. Jones, a petition of sundry citizens, resi-  
dents of Smith's Island, in Somerset county,  
praying the passage of an act for the protection  
of wild fowl in the vicinity of said Island.

The clerk of the senate returned the bill, to  
authorise the union of the Baltimore and Port  
Deposit Rail Road Company, the Wilmington  
and Susquehanna Rail Road Company, and the  
Philadelphia, Wilmington and Baltimore Rail  
Road Company, endorsed, "will pass with the  
proposed amendments," which amendments  
were severally read and assented to, and the bill  
ordered to be engrossed.

Also, a further supplement to an act to pro-  
vide for electing commissioners of Baltimore  
county, and prescribing their powers and duties,  
endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amend-  
ments."

Also, the bill, to change the compensation of  
judges and clerks of Elections, so far as relates  
to Carroll county.

Also, a supplement to an act, for the estab-  
lishment of the orphans' court of Carroll county.

Also, the bill, to provide for electing com-  
missioners for Carroll county, and prescribing their  
powers and duties, severally endorsed, "will not  
pass."

On motion of Mr. Biser,

Ordered, That the Treasurer of the Western  
Shore report to this house what has been the  
whole expense of laying down and surveying the  
Eastern Shore Rail Road, the Annapolis Rail Road,  
and the Maryland Canal, and what sums have  
been paid each person employed in said  
service.

Mr. Risteau, chairman of the committee on  
divorces, made an unfavourable report upon the  
following petitions, viz:

The petition of Susan McGinnis, of the city  
of Baltimore, praying to be divorced from her  
husband Patrick McGinnis.

Also, the petition of Elizabeth Harvey, pray-  
ing to be divorced from her husband Joseph  
Harvey, and,

The petition of Elizabeth Jane Kerner, pray-  
ing to be divorced.

Which were severally read the first, and by  
a special order the second time, and severally  
concluded in.

The bill reported by Mr. Brown, entitled, an  
act for the establishment of a civil municipal  
jurisdiction over a part of Anne Arundel county,  
and to alter and change the Constitution of  
this State, so far as may be necessary to effect  
the same—was taken up for consideration.

On motion of Mr. Brown, said bill was laid  
on the table, and made the order of the day for  
Friday, the 2nd of February.

The house then adjourned.

**THURSDAY, January 25th.**

John A. Matthews Esquire, a delegate return-  
ed from Charles county, to supply the vacancy  
occasioned by the resignation of William D.  
Merriek, Esquire, appeared, qualified and took  
his seat.

Mr. Sollers presented a memorial of sundry  
commission merchants of the city of Baltimore,  
praying that the garrot floors of the new in-  
spection house lately erected, may be used for  
the purpose of shaking out or putting in order,  
stayed or suspended tobacco.

Mr. Beani, a memorial of sundry citizens of  
Montgomery and Anne Arundel counties, pray-  
ing the passage of a law making it obligatory  
on the Maryland Canal Company to locate and  
construct their canal by way of the Seneca and  
Patuxent Rivers.

Mr. Risteau, a memorial of Susan Upton of  
the city of Baltimore, praying to be divorced  
from her husband Levi Upton.

Mr. Adams, a petition of sundry citizens of  
Somerset county, praying the passage of a law  
authorising the construction of a bridge across  
the south east fork of the Wicomico River.

Mr. Lemmon, a petition of sundry citizens of  
Somerset county, praying that a bridge may not  
be constructed across the south east fork of the  
Wicomico River.

Mr. Jones, a petition of sundry citizens of  
Somerset county, praying the passage of a law  
authorising the construction of a bridge across  
the south east fork of the Wicomico River.

Mr. Powder, a petition of sundry citizens of  
Carroll county, praying the passage of an act  
authorising the Botanical or Thompsonian sys-  
tem of medical practice, to be used and adminis-  
tered by persons not members of the Medical  
Faculty.

Mr. Jump of Caroline, a petition of Dorcas  
Chaffinch, of Caroline county, praying the pas-  
sage of an act to indemnify her for the loss of  
her property therein mentioned.

Also, a petition of sundry citizens of Caroline  
county, praying the passage of an act to incor-  
porate the Caroline silk company.

Mr. Lemmon, a petition of sundry citizens  
of Somerset county, praying that a bridge may  
be constructed across the south east fork of the  
Wicomico River.

Mr. Hillen, a petition of Rachel Harding of  
the city of Baltimore, praying to be divorced  
from her husband John H. Harding.

And, Mr. Hopewell, a petition of sundry citi-  
zens of St. Mary's county, praying for the con-  
firmation of a lot of ground therein mentioned,  
for a public landing.

Mr. M-n obtained leave to bring in a bill,  
to provide for building an arsenal in Hagerstown,  
Washington county.

On motion of Mr. Huddleson, leave was granted  
the committee on militia, to bring in a bill,  
entitled, an act, supplementary to an act, enti-  
tled, an act to enrol, organize, equip and regu-  
late the militia of the State of Maryland.

On motion of Mr. Biser,

Ordered, that the Treasurer of the Western  
Shore report to this house the amount of money  
paid for revising the laws of this State, with the  
sums paid to each person for that purpose.

The clerk of the senate returned the bill, to  
prevent the destruction of willow in the head  
waters of the Chesapeake Bay, in the several  
counties therein mentioned, endorsed, "will  
pass," ordered to be engrossed.

Also, the bill to incorporate the Leonardtown  
Steam Mill Manufacturing Company, endorsed,  
"will pass with the proposed amendments."

Which amendments were severally read, as-  
sented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed.

Also, the resolution relating to the east wing  
of the Barracks in Frederick town, in Frederick  
county.

And the resolution in favour of Adam Houck,  
severally endorsed, assented to, and severally  
ordered to be engrossed, and,

Delivered the following bills, originated in  
and passed by the senate, viz:—

A bill, to confirm an act, to amend the consti-  
tution and form of government of the State of  
Maryland, passed at December session, 1836,  
chapter 197.

A bill, to authorise the more safe and profit-  
able investment, y the levy court of Worcester  
county, of a part of the free schools' fund of  
said county, and for other purposes.

Mr. Biser reported a bill, entitled, an act to  
improve the police of Frederick.

Which was read the first, and by special or-  
der the second time, and passed.

The bill reported by Mr. McDaniell, from the  
committee on corporations, entitled, an act to  
incorporate the Order of United Brothers of  
Baltimore, was taken up for consideration, read  
the second time and passed.

The bill reported by Mr. Simmons, entitled,  
an act to confirm certain acts done by Thomas  
Allen, a justice of the peace in Anne Arundel  
county.

Was taken up for consideration, read the  
second time and passed.

The house adjourned until to-morrow morn-  
ing ten o'clock.

**FRIDAY, January 26th.**

Mr. Hughes presented a petition of James E.  
Keach and others, in the vicinity of Patuxent  
river, praying that the Legislature may adopt  
some efficient means to protect their property  
from depredations by persons engaged in catch-  
ing oysters in said river.

Mr. Rentsch, a petition of Hanson Jones, a  
free man of colour, of Washington county, pray-  
ing for the passage of a law to authorise and al-  
low his wife, to settle and reside with her hus-  
band in Maryland.

Mr. Geyer, a memorial of farmers, graziers,  
and other citizens of Frederick county, pray-  
ing the General Assembly to authorise the ap-  
pointment of a weigh master of live stock in the  
city of Baltimore.

Mr. Berret, a petition of Greenbury Shipley  
and Alexander Ellis of Carroll county, pray-  
ing for the redress of grievances therein men-  
tioned.

Mr. Biser a petition of the Rev. Samuel  
Heibner, of Frederick county, praying the pas-  
sage of an act, exonerating and releasing him  
from all penalty, fine or forfeiture, which he may  
have incurred by reason of his joining in mar-  
riage a certain Abraham Holm, who was a mi-  
nor,—and,

Mr. Turner of Caroline, a petition of Daniel  
Cheizam, and others, of Caroline county, to  
make valid a deed therein mentioned.

Mr. Alexander, a memorial of James F. Brice,  
of the city of Annapolis, praying the General  
Assembly to grant him a license to practice his  
theory of nature

Mr. Townsend, a petition of sundry citi-  
zens of Worcester county, praying the passage of  
an act authorising the construction of a bridge a-

cross the South-East fork of the Wicomico  
River.

ern Shore Rail Road, the Annapolis Rail Road,  
and the Maryland Canal, and what sums have  
been paid each person employed in said ser-  
vice,"

He has the honour to report, that no pay-  
ments have been made from this treasury on ac-  
count of the Annapolis and Eikridge Rail Road,  
or the Maryland Canal, and that the sums dis-  
bursed for account of surveying routes for the  
Eastern Shore Rail Road, have all been paid, as  
directed by the Executive, to the order of J. W. S.  
Carter, a treasurer of the commissioners, ap-  
pointed in pursuance of Res. No. 15, of 1835,  
and were as follows, viz:

Oct. 3, 6,000 00

1837, Feb. 6, 3,254 78

severally ordered to be engrossed.

Also, the bill to divorce
