JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS OF THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES OF THE STATE OF MARYLAND, DECEMBER SESSION, 1839.

MONDAY, March 25th, 1839.

The speaker laid before the house a report from the trustees of Cambridge Academy in Dorchester county.

Mr. Collins presented a petition of Stephen Riley, a soldier of the Revolution praying for a pension.

Mr. Schley a petition of Jacob Crone and Peter Young, praying for a supplement to the act incorporating Middletown in Frederick county.

Mr. Harcastle, a petition of sundry citizens of Caroline county, relative to the school fund of said county.

Mr. Hardesty also presented a petition of sundry citizens of Caroline county, relative to a certain road therein mentioned.

Mr. Stewart, a memorial from George C. Washington, President of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal Company, in relation to the affairs of said company.

Mr. Swann obtained leave to bring in a bill to allow Lewis N. Sewell, further time to complete his collections.

Mr. Roberts obtained leave to bring in a bill, to authorize Pere Wilmer, former collector of taxes in Queen Anne's county, to complete his collections.

Mr. Redden, leave to bring in a bill, to confirm and make valid the acts of Stephen Roach, as justice of the peace in and for Worcester county, from 1833, to 1838, inclusive.

Mr. Pitts, leave to bring in a further supplement to the act, directing the manner of suing out attachments in this province and limiting the extent of them.

Mr. Tyler, leave to bring in a bill, relating to the State Tobacco Warehouse No. 3, in the city of Baltimore.

Mr. Jones, leave to bring in a further supplement to an act, for the benefit of John S. Crockett and Cadmus Dashiell, administrators of Matthias Dashiell.

On motion of Mr. Stewart, Leave was given the committee on grievances and courts of justice, to bring in a bill, relating to the trial of facts in the several counties of this State.

Mr. Wilson reported a supplement to an act, to incorporate certain persons in every christian church or congregation in this State.

Mr. Powder reported a bill to repeal the act providing for the appointment of State Geologists.

Mr. Redden reported a bill, to confirm and make valid the acts of Stephen Roach, as justice of the peace, in and for Worcester county, from 1833, to 1838, inclusive.

Mr. Roberts reported a bill to authorize Pere Wilmer, former collector of taxes, in Queen Anne's county, to complete his collections.

Mr. Pitts reported a further supplement to the act directing the manner of suing out attachments in this province, and limiting the extent of the same.

Mr. Gever reported a bill to alter and amend the constitution and form of government, so as to provide for the election of county clerk and register of wills of Frederick county.

The house adjourned until to-morrow morning nine o'clock.

THURSDAY, March 26th.

Mr. Leary presented a petition of Sarah Thomas praying to be divorced from her husband David Thomas.

Mr. Leary also a memorial of 261 merchants, manufacturers, traders and others, of the city of Baltimore, praying the passage of the law now before the legislature, relating to foreign corporations and their agencies in this State.

Mr. Mason, from the committee on grievances and courts of justice, made a favourable report upon the bill from the Senate, for the benefit of the heirs of Alexander Kennedy, late of Washington county.

Resolved in the affirmative. And the bill sent to the Senate.

Mr. Spencer, chairman of the committee on grievances and courts of justice, reported a bill relating to the trial of facts in the several counties of this State.

Which was read the first, and by a special order the second time, passed and sent to the Senate.

Mr. Pitts, from the committee on grievances and courts of justice, made a favourable report upon the bill from the Senate, to enlarge the powers of the high court of chancery, and the several county courts, sitting as courts of equity, in this State.

Which was read the first, and by a special order the second time, passed and sent to the Senate.

Mr. Watson presented a memorial of Mary Ann Thomas, praying to be divorced from her husband John T. Thomas.

Mr. Pitts, from the committee on grievances and courts of justice, made favourable reports upon the following bills from the Senate, viz: The supplement to the act relating to mortgages, passed at Dec. session, 1833, chapter 181.

The supplement to the act for enlarging the powers of the High Court of Chancery.

The bill to confirm and make valid the proceedings of the sheriff of Carroll county.

The supplement to an act, to establish magistrates courts in the several counties of this State, and to prescribe their jurisdiction.

The bill to provide for the conveyance to the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, of certain real estate for public use.

The bill to authorize the commissioners of Charlestown in Cecil county, to convey to the trustees of the Presbyterian congregation, a lot or parcel of land in the town aforesaid; and.

The supplement to an act to regulate proceedings against corporations, passed at Dec. session, 1832, ch. 305.

Mr. Spencer, from the committee on grievances and courts of justice, reported a bill entitled, a supplement to the act, to amend and reduce into one system, the laws to direct descents.

Mr. Schley reported a bill to authorize the erection of a more commodious court house for Frederick county, and to furnish a place of safety for the land records, the last wills and testaments, the judicial proceedings, and other public papers of said county.

On motion of Mr. Wharton, The house took up for consideration the bill reported by him, entitled an act, for the relief of Thomas Fletcher, an insolvent debtor—The said bill was then read the second time, passed and sent to the Senate.

Mr. McPherson reported a bill for the benefit of St. Mark's Church in Frederick county, and.

Mr. Jones reported a further supplement to an act for the benefit of John S. Crockett, and Cadmus Dashiell, administrators of Matthias Dashiell.

Which were severally read the first, and by a special order the second time, passed, and sent to the Senate.

On motion of Mr. Blocher, The house took up for consideration the bill reported by him, entitled an act to permit the North Branch and Cacapon Turnpike Company of Virginia, to construct their road through the State of Maryland, so as to intersect the National Road in Allegany county.

The said bill was then read the second time, passed and sent to the Senate.

Mr. Dale reported a supplement to an act, to establish Magistrates' Courts in the several counties of this State, and to prescribe their jurisdiction, so far as the same relates to Montgomery county.

Which was read the first and by a special order the second time, passed and sent to the Senate.

Mr. Stewart presented a memorial of the Professors of the Faculty of Physic, in the University of Maryland, praying an inquiry into the acts of the trustees and other officers of said University.

On motion of Mr. Roberts, The house took up for consideration the resolution submitted by him, on the 21st inst., in relation to the Sudlersville Academy, in Queen Anne's county.

The said resolution was then read the second time, assented to, and sent to the Senate.

Mr. Wootton, chairman of the committee on internal improvements, made a communication to the house, in reply to the memorial of the president of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal Company, presented on yesterday.

On motion of Mr. Ridgely, The house took up for consideration, the bill reported by him, from the committee on ways and means, entitled a supplement to an act, relating to the Maryland Penitentiary.

On motion of Mr. Maulsby, Said bill was amended by striking out the 3rd section thereof.

The said bill was then read the second time as amended, passed and sent to the Senate.

On motion of Mr. Leary, The house took up for consideration the bill reported by him, entitled a further supplement to an act to establish pilots and regulate their fees, passed November last session, 1837.

The said bill was then read the second time, passed and sent to the Senate.

On motion of Mr. Schley, The house took up for consideration the bill reported by him, entitled a further supplement to an act to establish pilots and regulate their fees, passed November last session, 1837.

The said bill was then read the second time, passed and sent to the Senate.

Also, the supplement to an act to authorize the erection of a bridge over the Patuxent river at Brown's Ford, in Anne Arundel and Montgomery counties, and for extending the roads leading thereto.

Also, the supplement to an act, to authorize the Messrs. Shaefer, of Washington county to dispose of their property by lot.

Also, the bill to divorce Sarah Wareham of Washington county from her husband William Wareham.

Also, the bill for the relief of Robert Oldson, of Queen Anne's county.

Also, the bill to divorce Elizabeth Tritt, of Frederick county, from her husband Joseph Tritt.

Also, the bill for the relief of Mary Ann Hopkins of Frederick county.

Also, the bill to introduce the cultivat on of the mulberry trees, and growing of silk at the almshouse in Queen Anne's county.

Severally endorsed "will pass" and the bills severally ordered to be engrossed.

And delivered the following bills originated in, and passed by the Senate, viz: A bill to incorporate the Wyo Silk Company.

And a bill authorizing surveys in certain suits now pending in Baltimore county courts.

The house then adjourned until to-morrow morning nine o'clock.
