## SHIP NEWS

### Port of Baltimore.

#### ENTERED,

Amphion, Kilaun, Port-au-Prince  
Penguin, Johns, Aux-Cayes

#### From Bryden's Marine List. December 31.

The ship *Serpent*, Hays, hence, has arrived at the City of St. Domingo further by the *Amphion*, from Port-Prince. Left ship *Nancy*, Bruce, of Weston; schr. *Johanna*, of New York; fish brig *Gloucester*; schr. *Antelope*, of Boston. December 8, off the Horn, spoke ship *Alert*, Nash, of Boston, from Cape Francois to Gonaives. At the same time, was boarded by his Britannic Majesty's brig *Hunter*, and politely released. Next day, was boarded by the *Mahan* brig, who informed us that French privateers had captured the fish government schooner *Hazard*. On 27, off Hog-Island, spoke schr. *Gold*, from Cape Francois, for Baltimore. The brig *Two Brothers*, back of Baltimore, sailed from Jamaica 7. December, for St. Jago. The schr. *Nellor*, Murphy, of this port, sailed at Port-de-Paix, in SEVEN days for North Point!!!

#### Boston December 21.

Arrived, schooner *Sally*, Elder, 41 days from Port-au-Prince. Left Port-au-Prince, November 10, for New York, in 10 days; President, Boyd of Wiscasset, for New York, in 20; Libra, Perkins of Castine, for Boston, in 10; Betsy, Bailey, of New London, in 15; Ann, Lee, for Salem, in 8.—March 10, ship *Perseverance*, Closeworthy, 100 days from St. Petersburg, and 45 from Norway. Ship *Columbia*, Woodman getting under way, for Baltimore from Norway. Spoke, on 7, la 5, 16, long 31, W brig *Eleanor*, of Portland, 50 days from Liverpool, had on board 13 English prisoners. November 13, 43, 2, long 43, 51 W the ship *William Henry*, Laven from Russia for New York. Also, brig *Charles*, Russell, 61 days from Rotterdam.

Also, (anchored in Nantucket Roads) big rig, *Gover*, 60 days from Amsterdam. Left, on 10, Bowler, Post-mouth, just arrived, discharging; ship *Sawsey*, of Boston; schooner *William*, Gardner, from Boston; and 20 others. Sailed in co, with brig *Mercury*, Barker; schooner *Vulcan*, Harris, for Boston; *Melpomene*, Dabney, New York; *Seine*, for Baltimore; ship *Otto*, Philadelphia; and ship *Andrews*, of Newburyport, and up the Mediterranean.

#### December 22.

Arrived, brig *Oliver*, captain Crafts, 75 days from Cadiz. Sailed in co *Diana*, for Philadelphia. Left, the *Polly*, of Boston, and *David*, Gloucester. Spoke, November 6, lat. 39, 40, schooner *Four Brothers*, 47 days from Salem, short of Water. November 25, on the Banks, schooner *Polly*, of Maryland, to sail in 10 days—fish scarce.

#### December 23.

Arrived, brig *Henry*, from Amsterdam. Arrived at Flushing, September 4, *William*, for Savannah, but departed for London. At 10, 24th of *Henry*, from Baltimore. Sailed, November 17, E. Lovell, for Newburyport; W. Hunt, for Philadelphia; J. Booy, for Weston.

#### New-York, December 28.

##### Arrived since our last,

Ship *Ceres*, cap. Andrew Riker, from Bahia, and the Isle of France. The vessel arrived at Batavia the 14th July, and petitioned the Consul for a cargo. They refused to sell any coffee, sugar, pepper, as their stores were almost full of these articles. Sailed the 3d inst, and left the ship *Perseverance*, of Boston, who was refused a cargo to sail for Bengal in a few days.—The ship *Portsmouth Weeks*, of Baltimore, proceeded to Canton, and several other vessels had left Batavia, not being able to procure cargoes. Arrived at the port of France the 23d August—An English Squadron had arrived from France, to cruise off the Isle of France, consisting of the *Tremendous*, Commodore Form, Lancaster, and two frigates; to stop that station for six months. An cargo was laid at Port N. W. and remained until the 4th Oct. The ship *Edwards*, of New York, was spoken about 48 hours sail from the Isle

of France for Bourbon. Colonial produce very scarce; an extra duty of half a dollar was laid on coffee at Port N. W. and 2 1/2 dollars per 100 at Bourbon; and on tobacco 15 dolls. per 92

Ship *Cotton Planter*, Schovell, in 64 days from Liverpool.

Sailed in co. ships *Hiram*, French; John, Spaulding; Experiment Kennedy; British ship *Brothers*, Cummings; brig *Sally*, Cottle—all for New York; ship *Hope*, Pierce, for Savannah; President, Toby, for Cadiz, and *Fortune*, for Boston.

Nov 22, in lat. 43, 5, long. 53 spoke the schr. *Sally*, 45 days from Oporto for Salem. Dec. 6, in lat. 33 38, long. 55 20, spoke the ship *Littleton*, 17 days from Charleston for Nantz, with passengers. Nov 27, lat. 41 45, long. 62, spoke the ship *Fanny*, 45 days from Bordeaux for Boston.—About a week since, in 20 fathoms water, saw 9 ships and brigs, and a sloop, standing in. On Tuesday night, off the Hook, saw a large ship, supposed to be the *Hiram*, from Liverpool—Passengers, M. Cullen, Wm. Bennett, Robert Perry, J. Skinner, D. Delvell, and W. Bootle; and 6 in the steerage.

Sloop *Martha*, Barnes, in 17 days from Nassau, New-Providence. Fell in 3 days ago, with a Spanish brig, 33 days from St. Jago-de-Cuba, bound to New York. She had struck on shore on this coast, and lost her rudder and had her stern knocked in. Parted from her on Wednesday night, N. E. of Sandy Hook, in 28 fathoms water. Left the schooner *Sea Nymph*, Light, of Portland, having been ashore in Ship-Channel Key, where she was dismasted—was undergoing repairs.

The schooner *Argus*, White, in 27 days from Fredericksburg, and 17 days from Norfolk.

The *Argus* was blown off the coast three times, and her crew have suffered considerably.

Schooner *Charlotte*, capt. Little, 22 days from St. Martins, and 16 days from St. Croix, (Basse End)

Left the brig *Mountaineer*, Rogers, of New York; brig *Ridge*, and a schooner both belonging to Philadelphia. The brig *Sarah Ann*, Sampson, was to sail from West End in a few days. Saw a ship ashore yesterday near Cranberry Point and spoke a British ship off the Hook bound to this port. Passengers, Captains Perry and Pratt.

Schr. *Washington*, Barrett, from Richmond, and 4 days from Cape Henry.

Schr. *Lively*, Van Allen, in 3 days from the City of St. Domingo.

Left ship *Serpent*, Hays, of New York. Dec. 9, in lat. 32 7, long 74 spoke the ship *Orion*, 49 days from Bordeaux for Philadelphia. No news.
