NEW-YORK, Feb. 24. Captain Hillard, from Porto-Rico, informs that on the evening of the 4th of February he passed a British fleet of nine ships of war and a brig. The 3 headmost vessels were ships of the line—the force of the others he could not discern. The editors of the New York Gazette, received last evening a Barbadoes paper of the first instant, which contains a confirmation of the defeat of the French army by the allies, brought there by the Lubec Packet from Cuxhaven, which placed she left on the 14th of Dec. sent in by the Ethalion, capt. Spears.

A petition has been presented to the Legislature of this state from STEPHEN ALBON, convicted of murder, praying to be pardoned on certain conditions therein mentioned. It was referred to a committee of the whole house when on the speech of his excellency the governor. BARBADOS, January 25. At a court of Vice Admiralty held by the Hon. Judge Bedford at the Town Hall, on Friday the 17th instant, the case of the American ship Merchant, Joseph Wyer, master, detained by His Majesty's ship Ethalion, Charles Stewart, Esq. commander, came on to be heard; when his honor was pleased to condemn the said vessel and cargo as lawful prize to the captors reserving the question of private adventures. And on Friday, the 24th instant a court held at the same place, on the case of said private adventures, his honor

was pleased to order and decree, that the sameshould be restored.

February 1. His Majesty's ship Ethalion, Captain Spears, arrived here on Thursday last, & brought in with her the neutral schooner Lubec Packet, Andrew Wickham, master, from Cuxhaven, bound to Martinique and St. Thomas, which the Ethalion fell in with on the 27th ult. off Martinique and detained.

The Hon. Judge Bedford, at a Court of Vice Admiralty held on Thursday last was pleased to pass sentence of condemnation in the cause of the American ship Angeronia, from the coast of Africa bound to Charleston, detained by his Majesty's ship Princess Charlotte, decreeing the said ship and cargo, save the private adventures, to be lawful prize to the captors.

FRANKFORT, Jan. 25. Extract of a letter from a gentleman at Fort St. Stephens (Miss. Ter.) to his friend in this place, dated December 6th 1805.

"Governor Claiborne has sent Mr. Graham, to governor Folk at Pensacola, to remonstrate on the subject of Spanish duties at Mobile. Mr. Graham, in a letter from Pensacola, dated a few days since, says 'that governor Folk, agreed to suspend the order for the payment of duties at Mobile, upon receiving official assurance that no duties shall be demanded at Orleans, on goods destined for Baton Rouge; but that he will admit of no other terms.'

Mr. Graham has written to the government of the U. S. on the subject—but we are entirely at a loss to conjecture what will be the result.

"Had Spain a right to the country between the thirty-first degree of latitude, and the island of Orleans; there can be no doubt but that it would be just, and consistent with the spirit of our treaties with that power, that Spanish subjects passing up and down the Mississippi, with property destined to or coming from their country, and not intended to be landed in the United States, should not be burthened with duties to the American government. But I much doubt whether the government will think it expedient indirectly to sanction the Spanish claim to Eastern-Louisiana, by entering into a stipulation which, though it does not expressly recognise their right, cannot be founded on any other principle but that they are lawfully possessors of the country which they occupy. The determination is all important to the people residing on the waters of the Mobile, but I am satisfied that they do not wish to see the just pretensions of the nation to Eastern-Louisiana, at all weakened by my arrangements which might contribute to their immediate benefit.

"The British continue to harass the trade to Pensacola. We have lately heard a good deal of heavy firing, and thought that they might possibly be paying a visit to our neighbors at Mobile: but accounts from that place just received, informs, that it was only some Spanish vessels firing salutes in the bay.

"We have had a large concourse of Indians at this place for a week past, upwards of a thousand I suppose, who have come down to receive their annual presents. Some of them are highly dissatisfied with the treaty:—but the new chief Pushmatahay, a man of great eloquence and energy of mind, gave them a firm & undaunted talk—and put his opponents at defiance. These men were formerly much in honor with the late Spanish government here—and are mortified with the popularity and influence of the new chief, who has, however, the general countenance of the Choctaw nation, as well as of the United States' agents."

Captain Dixey, of the brig Nancy and Katy, from Campeachy, fell in on the 17th ult. with several Spanish vessels from Campeachy for Havana, and was detained until the 31st, when a British frigate engaged and captured after a smart action, the four armed brigs, the others made their escape. SPANISH PIRACY.

State of Georgia, Camden County. Before James Seagrave, Esq. Justiciary of the town of St. Mary's personally appeared, Peter Beyonda, who being duly sworn, declares as follows: That he sailed for about five months in the Spanish privateer schooner called the Vengeance, of which then was and still is commander, one Antonio Rico, a native of Corsica; that during the time this deponent sailed in said privateer, she captured and robbed several American vessels, among which was the schooner Two Brothers, captain Josiah Jordan, belonging to citizens of North Carolina, bound from Jamaica, to Newbern, N. C. having on board forty two casks of rum, and four

negro men, they being part of the crew—which four negroes were taken on board said privateer Vengeance, and were kept on board until her arrival at the Island of Amelia in East Florida; when this deponent and three of the negroes made their escape to the town of St. Mary's, and claimed the protection of the authority of their country, which was immediately afforded, notwithstanding the said piratical captain Rico followed with a part of his crew, and had actually taken this deponent prisoner in this town; and demanded that said negroes and this deponent should be delivered up to him, which demand being treated with the contempt deserved, the said Rico threatened to make reprisals on the property of the citizens and burn the town. This deponent declares that said Rico, offered the said four negro men for sale at Amelia Island, as his property—and further declares that he this deponent was on board said privateer, when Rico robbed the schooner Nelson of North Carolina, from Jamaica, for Charleston, S. C. of upwards of ten thousand dollars in specie, which was landed at Cuba & sent to Havana, where said privateer or piratical vessels is owned. That the schooner Brothers before mentioned was sent to Campeachy; and further this deponent saith not. Sworn to before me this 2d Dec. 1805. JAS SEAGROVE, Intendant.

Sampson says he belongs to Exom Newby, in Perquimans, N. C. Philip says he belongs to Samuel Nixon, in Perquimans, N. C.—Tom says he belongs to Robert Moore, Chowan county, N. C. Another Tom is still on board the privateer, belonging to captain George Haun, of Pasquatank, N. C.

NORFOLK, Feb. 20. A letter from a gentleman of the first respectability in Lisbon, to a merchant in this place, dated the 21st of December, contains the following: "We have no further news than the continued triumph of the French arms in Germany—after entering Vienna they still pursued the enemy, and the emperors of Russia and Germany have retired as far as Cracow, and Poland, in consequence of a great battle lost by the allies at Ast, near Brunn, in Moravia.

New-York, February 23. Arrived, brig Providence, Bunker, in 21 days from New-Orleans, and 16 days from the Balize. Left, schr. William Wright, Spence, of Baltimore, for Vera Cruz, in 3 days; ship Fair American, Davis, of Baltimore.

Also, brig Sussex, Hilliard, in 18 days from Porto-Rico. Left at St. Johns, schr. Adeline, Dameron, for Baltimore in 4 days.

Also, brig Amazon, Bourn, in 17 days from Guadaloupe. Left brig Seaflower, Wickham; schr. Brutus, Travis; and brig Eliza-Ann, Thompson, all for Baltimore, the latter to sail soon.

The pilot-boat schr. Mary Ann, Rowland, in 23 days from the Bay of Honduras. Sailed in co. with a British fleet, under convoy of the sloop of war Swift, amongst which was the British brig Betsey, Sproull, for New York. The brig Sally had arrived there in a long passage from New York, with the loss of some of her masts. Left, the ship Merry Quaker; and schr. Friendship, Burr, for New York. In lat. 24, 11, long. 82, the schr. Elizabeth, Fox, 17 days from Jacquemel for Philadelphia. The brig Edward, Connell, in 23 days from Trinidad, Cuba. Left, brig Danube, for New York in 20 days; ship Bristol, a prize, bought by H. Childs, of Baltimore, to sail in 12 days; the prize ships Botwick, for New York in 20; Chesterfield, do. do. bought by C. Ramsey; Sally, bought by H. Childs, waiting for a vessel to take out her cargo; Lucy, West, of Boston; and the brig Lion, Barker, of do. loading at Azagua, to sail in 20 days; brig Potomac, of Baltimore, just arrived. Passed the Florida reefs Feb. 14, and saw four square rigged vessels supposed to be ashore inside the reef—and passed several schrs. supposed to be bound to New Providence.

Alexandria, February 24. Arrived on Saturday, schooner Federalist, captain Harper, 17 days from St. Thomas.

Captain Harper informs, that a French fleet, consisting of 7 ships of the line and 16 frigates, passed St. Thomas steering towards the city of St. Domingo, and that a Danish schooner which arrived at St. Thomas, informed, that they had arrived and were landing troops. The British fleet passed St. Thomas six days after, consisting of 7 sail of the line, 1 frigate, and a brig; and about half an hour after, a ship of the line got under way from Tortola and followed; they steered for the city of St. Domingo, where it is probable they will overtake the French. Captain H. likewise informs, that it was reported at St. Thomas, that St. Bartholomews was taken by the French.
