Extract of a Letter from Algiers, Jan. 5. " This being the first opportunity I have had fince my being in flavery, I have embraced it by the Tryal floop of war, which arrived here about four or five days ago, the being bound to Plymouth. When I left London I went to Portimouth, and shipp'd myself mate of a ship for Lisbon, and arriv'd safe at Portsmouth the first of November from Lisbon; and the 8th following I shipp'd myfelf on board the unhappy ship I was taken in, the Endeavour, John Jones captain, my-felf mate; and 17th following sail'd from Portsmouth, bound to Civita Vecchia. In the Mediterranean, December 16. off the rock of Lisson, to my great grief, we fell in with an Algerine rover, who took me and two foremastmen out, and put ten Algerines on board, with orders to proceed to Algiers with the rover; two days after, it blowing a very hard gale of wind, we lost fight of our ship; at New-years day we arriv'd at this unnappy place, where I spent the Holy-days in slavery, and fo I am like to remain. Commodore Keppel has been here, with several of his majesty's ships. Here are at present about 500 Christian slaves, 45 of which are English. the commogore was here we expected to be releas'd; but are now cut of all hopes of liberty. My fetters weigh 36 lb. which, with the heat of the country and flavery, if I have not a speedy remedy, I cannot survive long. There is not one flave so heavily setter'd as myself. I am going up into the country, there to be kept clote confin'd, with four more flaves, for trying to make our escape; our enemies, fince that attempt, have been very cruel to us, are daily whipping us, and frequently threaten my life in particular: But I am determin'd, at the riique of my life, the first opportunity, to make the second aremost." the fecond attempt. GEORGE GALE.

April 9. By a letter from Bristol, dated April 5, we have idvice of the arrival of the Williamsburgh, Tate, from Virginia. He met with a sloop, blown out of George-Town in New-England, called the Molly, with only two men on board, and no provisions or lading, and tho' it then blew very haid, he fent his boat and took out the two poor fellows, and

brought them with him to Briftol.

Last Saturday John Stone, for setting Mr. Clark's barn and ricks on sie at Throwleigh in Kent; John Collington, for hiring the faid Stone to commit that wicked act; John Williams for burglary, and Francis Foster, for robbing on the lighway, were executed at Maidstone. Stone, Williams. and ofter, were conveyed from the jail to the gallows in a wagon, and Collington in a mourning coach, attended therein by clergyman. His behaviour to and at the place of execution vas the same as during the whole time of his lying under conemuation, which was morose and malicious, and casting very evere reflections on most of the gentlemen of the county in eneral, and more particularly on those in the neighbourhood where he had lived; and altho' pressed very much by the lergyman who attended him, to forgive his exemies, and die n peace with all men, as a thing abiolutely necessary to his dvation, he obstinately refused it.

Last Saturday night a lady returning in a hackney-coach fom the p'ayhouse to her house in Poland ftreet, was attacked y three footpads, who obliged her to get out of the coach, at then rifled her of a purse of about 20 guineas, a gold

tch and equipage with which they made off.

April 14. On Tuesday night a coach was attempted to be robbed by three footpads, between Knigabridge and Hy e-Park corner, but a horfeman coming up knocked one of them. down, upon which two made off, and the other was conduct, ed to prilon.

On Thursday night three fellows, armed with bludgeons, robbed several persons of their hate, wigs &c. in Whitechanel

road, some of whom they beat unmercifully.

Last night died, at his house in Park street, fir Chaloner, Ogle, knt. admiral, and commander in chief of his majesty's fleet; an officer whose integrity, courage, and abilities have been conspicuous in his long service of his country, upwards of 50 years. I'v those qualities which particularly adorned his profession, he added all those focial virtues, that goodness of hear, which makes his loss still more nearly regretted by those who have most k own him.

April 14. The court of lord mayor and aldermen of this city, sensible of the negiest of the officers whose duty it is to pnt in execution the laws against all diffolute, immoral, and disorderly practices, have issued out an order, strictly commanding all constables, churchwardens, Beadles, and other officers of justice within this city and its liberties, to be very diligent in the oscharge of their duty, and to apprehend and bring all such persons as they shall find offending immediately before a magistrate, that they may be dealt with according as the laws direct .- mee this order, several notorious baudy housekeepers have been committed to prison .- Forty years ago perfons feen drunk in the ffreets were publicly put in the flocks till they were forer; but in these polite days, they are suffered to go kome to their own beds, and fleep in peace.

March 6. His majesty's ship the Sphinx, Capt. Lloyd, was feen last Thursday morning, in very great diffress, at anchor a little to the Eastward of Seal Cliffs, almost on the French shore. She had cut away all her masts, and thrown all her guns, except two, overboard; by which they fav'd the ship and their lives: The same day she weigh'd and stood to the Northward; but it falling caim, they anchor'd a little to the Eastward of Calais, and on Friday bore away for Dunkirk

March 10. Last week a ewe, belonging to Mr. Kitter, yean'd five lambs; she also brought five lambs last year, and four the year before, i. e 14 tambs in three years, and not a fmail, weak, or deformed one in the whole number, but every lamb as large and firong as if the had had but one each year.

March 16. Charles Fitzgerald, who calls himfelf Earl of Desmond, was committed to New Gate for enlishing men into the service of the French king, which is made selony without benefit of clergy by the statute 9 Geo. II. He was in the late rebellion, and partion'd. Six other persons, Irish, were committed to the same place for the like crime.

March 29. Lay at the point of death, Mr. Thomas Ashburnham of St. Bride's parish, who after several tedious pere-grications through this troublesome life, having had nine wives, and now in the 97th year of his age, is defirous of be-

ing released.

Gioucefier, April 7. Yesterday was committed to our castle, Richard Cull, of Laverton, in this county, for flabbing Thomas Roberts with a knife, in so violent a manner that he immediately expired: They were both youths, the priloner

himself being but about 14 or 15 years old.
