My Lords and Gentlemen,

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HAVE postpon'd your Meeting to this Time, that I might consult your private Convenience, as far as was consistent with the Occasions of the Public. The Continuance of the present Tranquility has afforded an Opportunity for the former, and rendered the latter less prefing. Since the last S stion, my Care and Attention nave then constantly employ'd in improving the Situation: And I have constituted the Satisfaction to acquaint you, that I have consided Treaty with my good Brother the King of Spain, whereby such particular Differences, as, from the Nature of them, could be fettled in a general Treaty, have been amicably adjusted, the Intervention of any other Party; and the Commerce Arrive fettled in a general Treaty, have been amicably adjusted, whout the Intervention of any other Party; and the Commerce of my Subjects with that Country re established upon the most deantageous and fure froundations.

In the Prografs of this Work, I have received such Assurance of the sincere Disposition of the Catholic King to cement and appress in the most refrect Union with me, as leave no Room to

Your Majesty's paternal Care, always watchful for the Profperity of your Kirgdoms, and mix'd with a generous extensive Concern for the common Welfare of Europe, has appeared in nothing more, than ir your Endeavours to improve the profest State of Tranquility: This must be evident to al the World, from the Series of important Transactions which your Majesty has been pleased to lay before us; and it is with the u most Thankfulness, we acknowlege Your Goodness in communicating to us, that the Treaty has been so successfully concluded between your Majefly, and the King of Spain! As the Commerce of these King-doms is the Source of the Wealth of your Subjects; and of the Strength and Splendor of your Crown, to your Majefly's Attention to re-effeblish our Trade with that Country, on the most advantageous Conditions, is a fresh Instance of your uninterrupted Vigilance for the most effential Concerns of your People. Mutual Interest and mutual Inclination are the best Founcations of a lasting Amity and good Correspondence, which from the Con-currence of such Motives, we firmly hope will be happily restored between the Two Nations in all Parts, and that those Causey. which have long interrupted them, are now effectually removed.
Your Royal Wildom has not been confined to the acjutting of

present Differences, and the remedying of Inconveniences actually existing: It is with Pleasure we observe, that your Foresight is exerting itself to secure us, as far as can be come by human Prudence, against such Events as has formerly involved Europe in the Calamities of-War. In this View we look upon the Treaty, which your Majesty has lately concluded with the Elector of Bawaria, and the further Measures, which you are graciously pleased to inform us, are carrying on for securing the Tranquility, and supporting the System of the Empire. Nothing can tend more to effectuate these Measures, than the strengthening and consolidating the Ties of Union and Friendship between your Majesty and your Allies ; which cannot fail at the Tame Time

Majerty and your Allies; which cannot tall at the lame I ima to be attended with the best Consequences for promoting our mutual Interests, preserving the general Repose; and preventing the Occasion of any fatter Rupture.

We are truly sensible of your Majesty's Goodness, in Jaying before us, these your salutary Views and Intentions. Great Britain are very visible and we do with the greatest Chearfulness assure our Majesty of our steady and zealous Support in all such Measures, as may best answer these definable

Our unshaken Duty and Affection to your lacred Ferson, and our Love of our Country, are the surest Pledges of our Conduct. It shall be our first Care to demonstrate our inviolable Adherence to these Principles; nor shall any Thing be wanting on our Part, to advance the Trade and flohrishing Condition of these Kingdome; to enforce the Observance of the Laws, and of good Order amongst your People; and to maintain the Digonity and Strength of your Majelly's Crown and Government Both at Home and Abroad
