standing not knowing what he did and losing all
prudence. The said John McDannell states
that it was further proved that he went to
a store in open day to which he was accustomed
to be sent by Fonble and where he was well
known & in the name of the said Fonble asked
for the goods charged to be stolen and took them
away. That the said goods were charged to the
said Fonble's account, from whom he intended to
account for the same. And whereas nine of the
Petit Jury who passed verdict against the said
John McDannell, and there were twelve in all, found
