

The State of Maryland to Wit Whereas at a Court of
Oyer and Terminer and Gaol Delivery for Baltimore County
at July Term Instant Thomas Tate and Margaret Tate
his wife have been presented by the Grand Jury of the said
County for receiving from a Negro Man named Cabb on
the eleventh day of July eighteen Hundred and seven one
Barrel of Flour of the value of forty Shillings current
Money of Maryland of the goods and chattels of Walter
Simpson knowing them to be stolen and whereas it has
been most satisfactorily represented unto me that the said
Thomas Tate has heretofore borne an honest and respectable
character and that the said offence was committed
through the indiscretion of his wife. I have therefore
thought proper to order and direct that all Proceedings at
Law do cease and determine against the said Thomas Tate
and Margaret Tate and that no further prosecution be
had or carried on against them for or on account of the
same. Given under my hand and the Seal of the State
of Maryland this Seventeenth day of July in the year
of our Lord eighteen Hundred and seven
