

This is a copy of a letter from Thomas Dyer to the Court of the City of London, dated the 10th of November 1646. The letter is written in a cursive hand and is somewhat faded. It begins with "I have received your letter of the 10th of November" and continues with a discussion of a matter involving a person named Henry. The letter ends with a signature and the date.
