

5. Upon request of the said Duke of Cornwall, (which was made by the said Sturman by oath) to have restored to every one his own, as it was before of Rebellion, under forfeiture of treble damages. & hath by the said Sturman and since performed by the said agreement.

6. Can you certainly name by what name the said Deafe now claimed, to have been the said Sturman's, & marked out of Popes markes, into Sturman's proper markes, was truly & properly the said Sturman's calf, when it was in Popes markes. & how do you know it is true?

The Dep^t of the said Sturman in answer to the fore^s Interrogatories.

To the first.

This Dep^t saith, that this Deafe belonging formerly to the said Sturman, now will^m. Harditch, is marked by a right ear & 2 shes on the crop, w^{ch} of left ear shes, w^{ch} is the proper markes of the said Sturman. & of this Ten years he hath had this markes. And by this Dep^t knoweth it to be his markes, for he hath continually kept wth him.

To the 2^d.

That there is a blackish brown pyed heighfer, w^{ch} a whitish Tayle, & of sometime in the summer during the war, it was marked into the forest markes, out of Popes markes, w^{ch} then it had. The said Pope disclaiming any right he had to the said calf, now during it had his markes. And by this Dep^t appeared believed by the said Deafe now claimed by the said will^m. Harditch, to have the said markes: & to w^{ch} he is best of his conscience he believed, the said Deafe to be truly will^m. Harditch's.

To the 3^d.

That the forest the said Sturman had 12 or 14 head of cattle, young & old, before Jangle came in, & rayed rebellⁿ in this part: & of 5 or 6 of the said cattle were then milted coves. & further he this Dep^t saith to the best of his knowledge, that 2 coves only, & 5 calves were transported, or caused to be transported out of the part by the said Sturman.

To the 4th.

That since the coming of Jangle the said Sturman did not alter, or cause to be altered any Deafe of Mr. Copleys markes into the markes of the said Sturman, for neither he this Dep^t knew, or heard of. & further he saith that he never knew or heard that any of the cattle of Mr. Copleys markes were killed, or caused to be killed, by the said Sturman.

To the 5th.

He did understand that there was such an agreement made by the said Duke of Cornwall after his returne wth the said Sturman, & the rest of the Country, to restore unto every one, what was remaining of their estate in land, or else to pay treble damages. And by the best of his knowledge the said Sturman hath for his part completely performed the said agreement.

To the 6th.

That in the best of his conscience w^{ch} our friend or cousin he this Dep^t declared, the said Deafe now in question betweene will^m. Harditch & Mr. Copley was really & truly the proper goods of the said Sturman, when it was marked out of Popes markes into the said Sturman's markes.

The said Greenold deposed, at the request of will^m. Harditch, saith, that being prisoner at the said Sturman's, after the taking of the said Thomas's horse: the said Sturman asked this Dep^t if he saw the said pyed yearling heighfer, to whom he answered yes. & the said Sturman replied, if it was his. & to some of the said Duke's party had altered the markes of the said calf. & further this Dep^t saith, that the said Sturman told this Dep^t of sometime that summer the said calf came wth Mr. Popes Bull, & that he the said Sturman took it, & marked it into his own markes, as near as he could. But what markes it had before it was altered he knoweth not. & further he saith not.

This case respited till tomorrow morning.
