

first of June the said ship and goods for want of proof could not be adjudged. ~~It was~~ was adjudged to be seized into the hands of the Lord Proprietary there to remain for a year or a day, after which time she was to be adjudged Prize if no lawful right of other persons could be thereto made appear and by the said order more at large appears.

That since the said order search being made in the said ship certain Dutch Pequett's have on board the said ship bin found. That by the said Pequett's & brief it doth appear the ship belonged to Graft and the inhabitants of the United Provinces: That she was taken in Justice Bay in the Barbadoes that she had traded in the said Island, Landing there fower horses and diverse other goods & receiving on board sixe hog heads of sugar and seaventeen bags of Cotton of the growth of that Country, as appeared by the oath of Richard Stockdale That she was Laden at Amsterdam with French Brandy wine & french Canvas as appeared by the oath of Richard Stockdale also & some silkes all which were goods not of the growth of Holland, And therefore saith Judgment of the board.

The opinion & Judgment of the Council is That the ship St George & goods be inventorized & appraised & that his Lordship's Treasurer have power to sell and dispose of seaven tenths for which he is to be accountable to the Lord Proprietary in case the said ship & goods be found to belong or any ways appertaine to his said Lordship: otherwise to the persons who shall make Lawfull right appear thereto within a twelve month or a day intended to begin from the first day of June last; And that the other three tenths be deposited into the hands of his Lordship's Governor to be by him sold. He being accountable therefore in case any just claim be except by his said Lordship be made thereof within a twelve month and a day beginning from the first day of June as aforesaid.
