 Brother, and for want of such a Sister's son the Governour's
 was for this long generation, without further exception but till
 quindry ymo, who dyed without brother or Sister and appoynted
 daughter to be Quindry but that the Indians with stood it as being
 contrary to their custome, whereupon they chose Woghat also for their
 King who was descended from one of the Apoyngas's children
 But whic of them they knowe not, and Woghat also at his deate
 appoynted the other the Apoyngas's son to be King being descended
 from one of the first Kings the man they say was Jan Jan
 whic in their language signifye a true King. And would not
 suffer vs to call him Lawm, whic is the style they give to the son
 of their Kings, who by their custome are not to succeede in Rule
 his Brothers, or the Sons of his Sisters
 After this they made knowe to me the danger they were in of the
 Jaudoa Indians or Kingos who are a potent nation and had lately
 killed five of their men and threatened their shere for being
 Jaudoa's or Kingos who desired that for pay they might
 have foure English men to helpe them make their shere, for
 I promysed that I would call the Councill and after advise
 I would come up to Coroback and there send for them and
 thin my husband
