It is her of peace and amity concluded on the behalfs of the
Lord Proprietors of the Province of Maryland and the Sas-
sahannough Indians at a treaty begun at Spotsylvania the 16th
day of May 1664 between the Hon. Philip Calvert Esq.
Governor of the said Province Henry Courty Esq. Secretary
Baker Brooks Edward Heyd and John Bateman Esqs
Commissaries to his said Lord of the one parts and Bahadag
Soga of the great Torripin's family Sarangararo of the
wolfe family Sasandqua of the Chongtoquama nation
Sagorogugo of the unghobitt nation Saragundit of the
of the Saiquaridoga nation Unkankitwira of the
Usqughaya nation and Waddon hage of Sonondihago nation
of the other parts.

- It is mutually agreed that each shall according to former
agreement mutually assist one the other against the Enemies of
either nation upon him by not to give to date of this respectively
- 1 That such Indian men Prisoners as shall happen to be taken in
the wars, shall be delivered to the English as well out as hand
fills any English or others
 - 2 That the English shall send up to the Sasquedahannough
forts fifty men to help to defend the forts
 - 3 That the Sasquedahannoughs shall permit the Captains of the
English Soldiers to choose a place either within or without the
forts to fortifye himselfe in and that the Sasquedahannoughs
shall help them to get the logs or other timber or wood necessary
for his fortification
 - 4 That the Sasquedahannoughs shall find the English Soldiers
with sufficient fish and flesh, and bread ready made
 - 5 That there shall be six Indians appointed by the Sasquedahannoughs
to be ready to carry letters betwixt the Capt. of the English and the
forts, and to knowe the wayes howe, and from thence to the forts
again, to which ends two of them shall alwayes be upon Salme
Gland
 - 6 That for prevention of mischance that too often happens by misdeceit
having and not distinguishing Sasquedahannoughs from other
Indians, Sasquedahannoughs shall not come ordinarily to
