

Flod, but by Mingoes on Singoo

Proceed upon was taken into Consideration the Informations of John Taylor, Thomas Oveton and others taken at Opposition 13th May last and finding the Relation of Penn in the main to agree with the said Informations and the Governour and Councill talking to sundry that the said John Taylor after his Information in writing taken had often sayd that John Horster who shot at the Indian (as the Information) affirmed that he had killed him. Resolved to come to Articles with the said Penn upon this Consideration that the English had begun the wars by the said John Horsters killing the said Indian upon Easter daye

And forasmuch as it is certaine that the said Indians who shot at Horster shot at immediately, and after they killed Horster in the woods and upon the 17th day of Aprile next Worden and Dyak were the first kill upon the Eastern Shore and there murdered them and that the Mingoes on Singoo Indians were about to get by murdering wife and killing Cattle about Patuxent River and those Quarters as appeared by the Information of Robert Gorsuch taken 13th May aforesaid. Resolved that all further demands of satisfaction for those cattles be waived and that sufficient provision in the Articles be made for the security of our stocks of Cattle and hogs for the future, and that the treaty be immediately begun least Generall Stuyvesant at the Manhatans make an advantage by those Indians against us it being doubted whether there be a warre betwene Holland and England or not

Articles of peace and amity concluded betwixt the honorable Philip Calvert Esq. Governour Henry Bourne Secretary and Mr. John Bateman Councillor on the behalfe of the Lord Proprietary of this Province of Maryland and Penn King of Pithanonia on the behalfe of the Casagoube Indians on the other part vizt

It is imis that there shall be a perpetuall peace betwixt the people of Maryland and the Casagoube Indians
