 would be as Brother: This is urged to us as a matter of great
 consequence relating to the peace and safety of this Province; I
 therefore offer it to your Hon. serious consideration, and humbly
 request it may with all speed be communicated to y^r Hon. Council
 of this Province, that with all speed something may be done
 before they are wearied with staying and words come of it.
 This is with the Captain and my humble service to your Hon. and
 the rest of the Hon. Council is all from

April 7: 1685.
