with him the said Coll. George Calbott guard as aforesaid, and
forthwith convey and transport him over into the said Colony
of Virginia; to be delivered to the said Lord Effingham as
aforesaid, and upon such delivery to crave his Acknowledgment
thereof by receipt under his hand, for his Maj^{ties} Service.
Herby also earnestly requesting and desiring All and singular
the Magistrates Officers, and others his Maj^{ties} Loving Subjects
within the said Colony of Virginia (upon the arrivall of the
J. Gilbert (ark and his charge thereto,) to afford him all
necessary aid and assistance, in the secure and safe conduct
and guard of him to the said Lord Effingham, pursuant to
his precept, and for his Maj^{ties} Service; In full confidence
and assurance of the like unchangeable Neighbourly Kindness
and correspondency upon all occasions from this Governmt.

We have just received his Maj^{ties} pleasure con-
cerning Coll. Calbott signified to us by his Maj^{ties} Mast^{er}
pursuant and in obedience whereunto we not sooner read the
same, but immediately took care for the speedy and safe
conveying, and delivering of Coll. George Calbott to your Excell^{encies}
hands, in ord^r to his passage for England according to his Maj^{ties}
commands -

And accordingly by Mr. Gilbert Clark with
a guard of six hundred men (sixty four howers) well armed
and provided with swords Guns pistolls and ammunition,
we send you the body of the said Coll. George Calbott,
whom
