

Philemon Hopper Esquire, was appointed, <sup>an</sup> associate Judge of the second Judicial District, <sup>via</sup> Bullitt declined accepting.

Erastus Spence Esquire, was appointed an associate Judge of the fourth Judicial District, <sup>via</sup> Robins declined.

Enoch S. Millard Esquire, was appointed Register of Wills of St. Marys County, <sup>via</sup> Forrest declined.

Jacob Deery, was appointed a Justice of the Peace of the City of Baltimore, <sup>via</sup> Small.

Singleton Duval Esquire, was appointed States Agent for the District and <sup>via</sup> Kennedy resigned.

Wm. Hillen, John Ogston and Robert Button, Esquires, who were appointed by His Excellency the Governor on the first day of August last to view and examine eight miles of the Baltimore and Head of De Graaf Turnpike Road, represented by the President and Managers of the Company to have been perfected, in addition to the fifteen miles heretofore licensed, and to report to him in writing the result of their examination, having reported that they had performed the duty assigned them, and found the said Road for eight miles, in addition to the fifteen miles heretofore licensed, extended and executed in a masterly and workman-like manner, according to the true intent and meaning of the act of incorporation of the said Company, a License under his hand and the great Seal of the State, authorizing them to receive the several Tolls allowed them by Law, was issued by His Excellency (See Turnpike Road Record)

His Excellency the Governor, this day granted pardons to the following persons, recommended by the Directors of the Penitentiary, viz  
To Fanny Coward, on account of "Tulony" for which she was convicted in Baltimore City Court, and on the 11 day of June 1825 sentenced to the Penitentiary for four years. (See Pardon Record)

To Edward Parker on account of a "Rape" for which he was convicted, in Anne Arundel County Court, and on the 17th day of July 1818, sentenced to the Penitentiary for 15 years. (See Pardon Record)

To Joseph W. Rockwell on account of "Forgery" for which he was convicted, in Baltimore City Court, and on the 26th day of February 1824, sentenced to ten year confinement in the Penitentiary. (See Pardon Record)

To William Scrivner, on account of an attempt with intent to kill and burglary, for which he was convicted, in Anne Arundel County Court, and on the 6th day of May 1820, sentenced to the Penitentiary for ten years. (See Pardon Record)
