

an agreement with them, made in the year 1824 and that they as he believes have always since that time been regularly licensed as vendors of Lottery Tickets. That at the time of selling the said Tickets, for which he was fined, he did not know that any Law had been passed by the Legislature at the session of 1824, confining the License obtained in such cases to one office or place, and that as soon as he was informed that such a Law had passed, he desisted from selling Tickets, and did not sell any thereafter. He avers that he did not, designedly, violate the Law but became subject to its penalty through ignorance of its provisions. The foregoing statement of the petitioners verified by his oath. And the said petitioners being recommended to Executive Clemency by the said Court, and many other respectable citizens of the County aforesaid, who state their belief in the truth of his statement. We do, hereby, remit the said fine.
