By the petition of William Wooddin accompanied by a transcript from the Records of Allegany County Court, it appears that he was fined by the said Court at April Term last, the sum of one hundred dollars for selling dry goods without Licence. The petitioner states that he is by profession an ordinary keeper, that he has regularly taken out Licence for retailing liquors, that he has lately purchased Dry Goods to retail, and that at the time of selling the Dry Goods for which he has been convicted, he was firmly under the belief that the Licence taken out as an ordinary keeper comprehended that for retailing Dry Goods, that being an illiterate man and totally ignorant of the Law in the matter of which he has been convicted he applied to persons whom he thought cognizant of the Law on that subject, and was informed that under a Licence for an ordinary he could retail dry goods, in consequence whereof he proceeded to retail and incurred the penalty aforesaid. that so soon as he discovered himself liable to incur the penalty of the Law, he obtained a Licence for retailing dry Goods. He states that the offence was not intentionally committed, but altogether through ignorance and this information, in his, therefore prays such relief as may be proper. And the Court having recommended the petitioner to Executive Clemency in W do, hereby remit the moiety of the aforesaid fine which accrued to the State.

By the petition of Mary Oakes, accompanied by a transcript from the Records of Baltimore County Court, it appears that she was fined by the said Court at March Term 1827 the sum of sixteen dollars for selling one pint of Whiskey without Licence. The petitioner states that she was left a Widow some years since, with a young and rising family of six children, and at the time of the death of her husband pregnant, that she keeps a small Grocery in a Village called Hook's Town in Baltimore County, and not knowing the consequences did sell a small quantity of liquor without Licence, that being totally unable to pay the said fine, she prays that the same may be remitted. And the Court having recommended the said petitioner to Executive Clemency in W do, hereby remit the said fine.
