The State of Maryland to wit: Whereas, in compliance with a demand of His Excellency John Andrew Shulze Governor of the State of Pennsylvania, a certain George Moseley or Meschert, who stands charged by sundry depositions certified as authentic and transmitted to the Executive Department of this State by the said John Andrew Shulze Governor as aforesaid, with the crime of Larceny alleged to have been lately committed in the City of Philadelphia, has been seized (the delivery to John Christine one of the Constables of the said City of Philadelphia agent of the said John Andrew Shulze Governor as aforesaid, for the purpose of being removed and transported to the said State of Pennsylvania (from whence he had fled) for trial for the said alleged offence, according to Law. Now, therefore, I Joseph Kent Governor of Maryland, do hereby require and enjoin all persons within this State to let the said John Christine agent as aforesaid pass with the said fugitive un-molested to the said State of Pennsylvania: he the said John Christine conducting himself in a peaceable and orderly manner, and using no improper severity or cruelty in his treatment of the said prisoner.

His Excellency the Governor this day attended in the Council Chamber, and granted a Pardon to a certain George Washington Reed on account of a "Felony" of which he was convicted at Caroline County Court at October Term 1826, and for which he was sentenced by the said Court to three years confinement in the Penitentiary (See Pardon Record)

His Excellency also this day granted a Pardon to a certain Stephen Weaver, on account of "spanting and beating Jonathan Blufford, with intent to kill and murder," of which he was convicted in Baltimore County Court at March Term 1827. (See Pardon Record)

His Excellency also this day granted a Pardon to a certain John Piles, on account of "stealing one peck of Flour," of which he was convicted in Talbot County Court, at May Term last, and for which he was sentenced by the said Court to two years confinement in the Penitentiary. (See Pardon Record)

The following demand was made upon the Honorable William Branch, Chief Justice of the Circuit Court of the District of Columbia for the person therein named as a fugitive from Justice, upon application and information and evidence therein mentioned, being filed in this Court.
