only hope to attain this most desirable object by steadily maintaining and supporting
a good moral reputation, - and finally, that this claim if successful, must
reduce him to a state of great distress and helplessness. He, therefore, prays
for Executive Mercy. And sundry respectable Citizens of Alexandria,
aforesaid, having stated, that the petitioner, ever since he became a citizen
of that place, has supported an excellent Character and that he enjoys their
esteem and respect, - and the aforesaid Court having recommended a remission
of the said forfeiture, we do, hereby, remit the same.
