

by Law to take charge of all the Wharves belonging to the State within the City of Baltimore, and that part of the public Wharf on Pratt Street remain to the use of the citizens of this State, and to proceed to perform the several duties required of him by Law, and to deposit monthly in the Bank of Baltimore, the amount of Wharfage, which he is required by Law to deposit, to the credit of the Treasurer of the Western Shore.

Ordered that the Clerk of the Council write to Lawrence Newman and request him to consult with the inspectors of Adams at the State Warehouse, and to have such repairs made to the Warehouse purchased of Williams & Pinckell, as upon examination he and the said inspectors may deem indispensable to prevent it from further injury.

By the Petition of Edward Hambleton of the City of Baltimore, accompanied by a transcript from the Records of Baltimore City Court, it appears that the said Edward Hambleton was fined by the said City Court, at February Term last, in three several cases, the sum of twenty four dollars in each case, for selling liquor without License.

The Petitioner states that at the time the alleged offenses were committed, he had a Wholesale License for a Grocery and liquor store, that he was not aware of the impropriety of the acts alleged against him, and that when informed thereof he steadily refused from that time, to do the same or permit it to be done by those with whom he was concerned; that he has resided in the City of Baltimore for a number of years, and that his character has never before been questioned; that he has never before violated knowingly, or willingly, any of the Laws of this State; that he has a large and increasing family who require all the exertions and money he can make, to procure them the necessary means of support and comfort in a respectable way, and who are dependant on him alone for their support. He therefore prays for a remission of the said fines. And the Court having recommended a remission of the said fines. We do hereby remit the same.
