

Friday April 20<sup>th</sup> 1832

His Excellency the Governor, having called a meeting of the Council to be held this day, His Excellency and the Honble Thomas Worthington and Robert W. Bowie, members of the Council attended.

His Excellency this day granted a Pardon to James Berry on account of an assault with intent to murder: of which he was convicted in Baltimore County Court, and for which he was sentenced to the Penitentiary for two years. (See Pardon Record)

His Excellency also this day granted a Pardon to Joseph Lewis, on account of "Felony": of which he was convicted in Allegany County Court at October Term 1830, and for which he was sentenced to the Penitentiary for ten years. (See Pardon Record)
