

August 23rd 1832.

His Excellency the Governor this day granted a Pardon to Solomon Wilson, negro, on account of Stealing Bank notes and money to the value of ten dollars & ninety cents, of which he was convicted in Baltimore City Court at February Term 1828, and for which he was sentenced to the Penitentiary for ten years. (See Pardon Record)

August 31st 1832.

Ordered that the Treasurer of the Western Shore pay Henry Thompson or order one hundred and eight dollars five cents for the purchase of firewood to be accounted for.

September 3rd 1832.

His Excellency the Governor this day granted a Pardon to Patrick McCabe on account of Stealing six Liverpool plates, for which he was convicted in Baltimore City Court at June Term 1832, and for which he was sentenced to the Penitentiary for two years. (See Pardon Record)

September 5th 1832.

His Excellency the Governor, this day granted a Pardon to William Rose, on account of Stealing, for which he was convicted in Anne Arundel County Court, and for which he was sentenced to the Penitentiary for two years at November Term 1830. (See Pardon Record)

His Excellency the Governor also this day granted a Pardon to Peter Stuyvesant, on account of Stealing, of which he was convicted in Harford County Court, at August Term 1826, and for which he was sentenced to the Penitentiary for seven years. (See Pardon Record)

Thursday September 13th 1832.

The Council having been called to meet this day

His Excellency the Governor, and the Hon^{ble} Sam^l Turner, attended in the Council Chamber.

His Excellency the Governor, and the Hon^{ble} William Potter and Samuel Turner attended in the Council Chamber, when a board not having been formed, and the Hon^{ble} Charles Bowie being unable to attend, from indisposition, it was ordered to proceed to his residence, and on
