

September 2nd 1832.

Ordered that the Treasurer of the Western Shore pay Alexander Jones or order forty dollars fifty cents, viz \$35 for publishing in his paper the act relating to the colored population and to Licenses, by order of the Govt of the District, in virtue of authority of the General Assembly; \$3.50 for publishing a notice for proposals for delivering the Laws, and Proclamations of Appointment of Representatives in Congress, by order of the Executive, in virtue of authority of the General Assembly; and \$2 for publishing Proclamations for transcribing &c, by order of the Governor. & account proved & passed.

September 24 1832.

Ordered that the Treasurer of the Western Shore pay Isaac Mumroe or order seventy dollars twenty five cents viz for publishing in his paper the act relative to the colored population and Licenses, by order of the Govt of the District, in virtue of authority of the General Assembly; \$33 for publishing an act to abolish imprisonment for debt an act to authorize the construction of the Baltimore and Ohio Rail Road to Washington and Proclamations of the appointment of Representatives, by order of the Executive, in virtue of authority of the General Assembly; \$22 for publishing three Proclamations, advertisement for proposals for printing, order to the Law, advertisement for proposals for Stationary, advertisement of the re-instating of a Show in show, by order of the Executive \$10.75; and for one year subscription to his paper, up to the 18th of January 1833. \$5, & amount proved & passed.

The following Demand was made this day for the persons therein named as fugitives from Justice, upon the information and evidence therein mentioned being filed in the Executive Department. viz

To the Hon^{ble} William Branch, chief Justice of the Circuit Court of the District of Columbia.

Whereas William C Gill and Wentworth Saunders stand charged by affidavit with having stolen and carried away from the City of Baltimore two Horses belonging to James H McCulloch Esquire, of the said City. And whereas information has been received, at the Executive Department of this State, that the said William C Gill and Wentworth Saunders have fled from Justice, and been apprehended and lodged in the City of Washington. And it being important and highly necessary for the good of Society, that the perpetrators of such offences should be brought to Justice. Now therefore, I George W. Cousins, Governor of the State of Maryland, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and Laws of the United States, do hereby demand that you William C Gill and Wentworth Saunders, as fugitives from Justice of this State, and make known to your honor, that I have appointed Mr George W. Riggs, one of the Constables of the said City, & I have my agents to receive the said fugitives and bring them
