

Saturday January 19<sup>th</sup> 1833.

His Excellency the Governor attended in the Council Chamber.

Sunday January 20<sup>th</sup> 1833

His Excellency the Governor attended in the Council Chamber.

Ordered that the Treasurer of the Western Shore pay a U. S. 1/2  
Copper or Silver one dollar for hauling Bricks, Lime and Sand for work on  
the State House, Payment proved & paid.

Tuesday January 22<sup>nd</sup> 1833

His Excellency the Governor attended in the Council Chamber.

The Hon<sup>ble</sup> Samuel Turner & Thomas C. Worthington, councillors  
elect also attended this day in the Council Chamber, and legally qualified  
by taking the Oath prescribed by the Constitution and Laws of this State before  
Edward Dubois Esquire, one of the Justices of the Peace for said Annapolis  
County, and by subscribing a declaration of his belief in the Christian  
Religion.

His Excellency the Governor this day granted a Pardon to  
William Arthur, on account of Manslaughter, of which he was convicted  
in Baltimore County Court, at November Term 1830, and for which he  
was sentenced to the Penitentiary for five years. (See Pardon Record).

Wednesday January 23<sup>rd</sup> 1833

His Excellency the Governor, and the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Samuel  
Turner and Thomas C. Worthington attended in the Council Chamber.

His Excellency the Governor having received notice agreeably  
to Law from the President & Directors of the Columbia Turnpike Road  
Company that they have finished an additional five miles from Catland  
Hills towards Washington - nominated and appointed John C. Meems,  
Hammond Corsey and Thomas McLean, to view and examine the same  
and report to him in writing the result of their examination, as prescribed  
by the act of incorporation of the said Company: and Commission  
issued accordingly. (See Turnpike Road Record).

Thursday January 24<sup>th</sup> 1833.

His Excellency the Governor, and the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Samuel  
Turner and Thomas C. Worthington attended in the Council Chamber.

His Excellency the Governor this day granted a Pardon  
Thomas Smith on account of Horse Stealing, of which he was convicted  
in Frederick County Court, and for which he was sentenced  
for five years.
