

Friday January 25th 1833.

His Excellency the Governor and the Honorable
James O. Turner & Thomas C. Worthington attended in the Council Chamber.

The Honorable John A. Martin & William Patton, members of
the Council elect, this day appeared in the Council Chamber, and were
legally qualified as members of the Council, by taking the Oath prescribed
by the Constitution and Laws of this State, before Edward Dubois Esquire
one of the Justices of the Peace for Anne Arundel County, and by subscribing
a declaration of their belief in the Christian Religion.

The Honorable Robert Bowie, member of the Council
elect, being confined to his room in his apartment at the City Hotel, by
indisposition, was qualified there as a member of the Council, by
taking the Oath prescribed by the Constitution and Laws of this State,
before Edward Dubois Esquire, one of the Justices of the Peace for
Anne Arundel County, and by subscribing a declaration of his
belief in the Christian Religion.

The Council appointed Thomas Corbitt, their Clerk:
who thereupon qualified as such, by taking the Oath prescribed by
the Constitution of this State, and of the United States, before Edward
Dubois Esquire, one of the Justices of the Peace in and for Anne
Arundel County, and by subscribing a declaration of his belief in
the Christian Religion.

On the nomination of His Excellency the Governor,
and by and with the advice and consent of the Council, Henry
Tompson was appointed Messenger of the Council: who thereupon
qualified as such, by taking the Oath prescribed by the Constitution of
this State, and of the United States, before Edward Dubois Esquire
one of the Justices of the Peace in and for Anne Arundel County, and
by subscribing a declaration of his belief in the Christian Religion.

The following Ordinance passed by His Excellency the
Governor, upon the demand and information and evidence therein
mentioned:

The State of Maryland, to the Warden of the Jail
of Baltimore City and County, greeting: Whereas it appears from
authentic documents received and transmitted to the Executive Department
of this State, by His Excellency George Wolf, Governor of the State
of Pennsylvania that a certain William Wood, alias Copington, late
of the City of Philadelphia, stands charged on oath with entering, and
being by means of false keys and hearing, goods therefrom, and that
the said William Wood, alias Copington, has fled from the Justice
