the proprietor of a public house in Anne Arundel County, yet that his License
had been regularly obtained by his brother in Law, a certain Lot Ensey, and
in his name and that he having forgotten to do so at the proper time, and
the petitioners supposing that he was acting under a License occasioned him
to violate the Law, contrary to his wishes and intentions. He therefore prays for
a remission of said fine. And the said Court having recommended a
compliance with the prayer of the petitioner, we do hereby remit said fine.

By a transcript from the Records of Baltimore City Court,
it appears that a recognizance was entered into by Robert Curtain and
Thomas Curtain in the sum of one hundred dollars each for their appearance
to answer the said City Court to answer a charge of felony and that the
said Recognizance was forfeited as to the said Robert Curtain.

The said City Court states that it having appeared on the
trial of Robert Frank charged with the same offense, as a
confederate of Robert Curtain, that there was no foundation to suspect
the parties of a criminal intention, and said Frank having been
acquitted by the Jury and the Deputy Attorney General having
declared his intention to abandon the prosecution against said Curtain,
we recommend a remission of the penalty of said Recognizance.
We do therefore hereby remit said forfeiture.

By the petition of Benjamin Gamme, and a transcript
from the Records of Allegany County Court, it appears that he was
fined by the said Court, at April term 1833, the sum of forty
dollars, for putting a Fish Dam in Potomac River.

The petitioner states that being ignorant he submitted
to the Court without having witnesses summoned or taking steps
making a fair exhibition of his case which he thinks would have
acquitted him. He represents that he spent a few hours in erecting
said Dam, by the request of others without the least interest therein,
that said Dam does not obstruct the navigation of said River,
and that therefore had proper exertions been made he would have
been
