Mr Bowie submitted the following Resolutions Vis  
 Resolved, by the Governor & Council, that the accounts presented to this Department by Littleton C. Peckle and James Raymond Esquires for supervising the printing of 230 pages purporting to be part of the Report on the digest of the Constitution and Laws of this State prepared by John Buchanan and Rev. Henry Hanson Esquires, is considered exorbitant, and the same cannot be allowed.

Resolved, that the appointment of Littleton C. Peckle Esquire, as one of the Supervisors of the printing of the Report on the Digest of the Constitution and Statutes of this State, prepared by John Buchanan and Rev. Henry Hanson Esquires, be from this day forth vacated, experience having satisfied the Executive that the said appointment is unnecessary: one Superintendent being amply sufficient.

A demand being made that the question be taken upon the said Resolutions, separately, The question was put upon the first Resolution, and determined in the affirmative.
