

Thursday November 25th 1837.

His Excellency the Governor this day granted a Pardon to Thomas Neill, on account of an assault & battery on William K. Story, of which he was convicted in Queen Anne's County Court at November Term 1837, and for which he was sentenced to pay a fine of one dollar and be imprisoned in the Jail of said County for three months (see Pardon Record).

Monday November 27th 1837.

His Excellency the Governor this day granted a Pardon to William Keating, on account of an assault & battery on James Graves, of which he was convicted in Kent County Court, at September Term 1837, and for which he was sentenced to pay a fine of one dollar and undergo a confinement in the County Jail for six months.

The following orders were issued for the arrest and surrender of the parties therein named, as fugitives from Justice, upon the Demand and information and evidence therein mentioned. *W^o*

The State of Maryland, To the Sheriff of Harford County, Greeting:
Whereas, it appears from authentic documents certified and transmitted to the Executive Department of this State, ~~by~~ His Excellency Joseph Ritner Governor of ^{the State of} Pennsylvania, that Nathan Bernis, Jacob Hornwood, Stephen Lewis and Edward Prigg, stand charged by Indictment of the grand Inquest of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, enquiring for the County of York, in the said Commonwealth, with having on the first day of April last, at the County aforesaid, with force and violence, feloniously taken and carried away from the said County to the State of Maryland, a negro woman named Margaret Morgan, with a design and intention of selling and disposing of her as and for a slave or servant for life, contrary to the form of the Statute in such case made and provided, and against the peace and dignity of the Commonwealth; and that the said Bernis, Hornwood, Lewis and Prigg have fled from the Justice of the said State, and are now in Harford County, in this State.

And whereas the said Joseph Ritner, Governor as aforesaid, hath, in pursuance of the Authority given in such cases by the Constitution and Laws of the United States, demanded the said Bernis, Hornwood, Lewis and Prigg of the Executive of this State, as fugitives from Justice, and appointed Edward Klinefelter Esquire, Sheriff of the said County of York, his agent to receive the said fugitives and transport them to the said State of Pennsylvania, for trial for the said offence. Now therefore, Thomas W. Nagaw, Governor of the State of Maryland, have thought proper, in compliance with the
