

May 18th 1848.

The Governor this day appointed and commissioned Moses Norman Edward Schley and David Boyd of Frederick County Commissioners to view examine and report on the condition of the Frederick and Emmittsburg Turnpike as provided for by the Act of Assembly of 1844 chapter 136.

The Governor appointed and commissioned Gaspary Winterson Justice of the Peace for Anne Arundel County vice R. H. Carr resigned.

May 19th 1848.

The Governor this day appointed and commissioned Connygo Corden 1st Lieut in Capt Connygo Company 33rd Regiment of M. M. and also Thomas Read 2nd Lieut in the "Washington Guards" 9th Regiment of Maryland Militia.

The Governor on the recommendations of numerous citizens of Talbot County pardoned William T. Stibbing and remitted the fine imposed on him by Talbot County Court on his conviction for an Assault and Battery and for which offence he was sentenced to a confinement in the County Jail and fined.

The Governor appointed and commissioned Philip L. Moore a Justice of the Peace for Baltimore County to reside in Baltimore City vice John Young resigned. He also appointed and commissioned David Duford Chief Justice of the District Court of the North District of Carroll County vice Francis A. Davis resigned.

The Governor on the recommendations of numerous and highly respectable citizens of Somerset County remitted the fine imposed on Levi T. Hughes by Somerset County Court for interrupting the election in October 1847.

May 20th 1848.

The Governor this day appointed and commissioned Eliphat Willis as 2nd Lieut in Capt Garrit M. Hart's Company in the 21st Regiment M. M.

The Governor this day rejected the petition of certain citizens of Calvert County praying for a pardon for Isaac Tucker.

May 22nd 1848.

The Governor this day appointed and commissioned John W. Carroll Coroner in Kent County vice William Thomas of W^m resigned.

The Governor appointed and commissionedALLERY D. Higgins as Justice of the Peace for Montgomery County vice Lloyd Green removed from the County.
