

according to the laws of this state that a certain Mulleary Dorsey a mulatto man together with a mulatto woman named Charlotte and her female child stand charged with the crime of stealing a horse the property of one Samuel J. Street and it has been represented to me that they have fled from the justice of this state and have taken refuge within the state of New York.

And therefore pursuant to the provisions of the constitution and laws of the United States in such case made and provided I do hereby request that the said Mulleary Dorsey and negro woman named Charlotte with her female child be apprehended and delivered to A. G. Pugh the Agent of this state appointed for the purpose who is hereby duly authorized to receive and convey them to the state of Maryland that they be dealt with according to law.

In witness whereof I have hereunto affixed my name and the Great Seal of the state this thirtieth day of January in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty.

The Governor this day upon the recommendation of Judge Asst. Asst. and of many respectable citizens of Baltimore city pardoned Mitchell Tarkenton convicted in Baltimore city court at June term 1848 and sentenced to be confined in the Penitentiary until the 18th June 1850.

Also upon the recommendation of many respectable citizens of Baltimore city pardoned David Andrews convicted at November term 1844 of Baltimore city court of murder in the 2<sup>nd</sup> degree and sentenced to confinement in the penitentiary upon condition that he leave the state of Maryland and the United States within three months never to return any more.

1<sup>st</sup> February 1850

The Governor this day upon the recommendation of the jury by whom he was tried and convicted and of many of the most respectable citizens of the same city pardoned Lewis Cummings convicted in Baltimore city court at February term 1848 of manslaughter and sentenced to serve and labor in the penitentiary until 2<sup>nd</sup> April 1851.

The Governor nominated to the Senate Doctor William Jackson for clerk of Dorchester county court.

2<sup>nd</sup> February 1850

The Governor this day rejected the application for a habeas corpus to John M. Smith indicted in Baltimore city court for obtaining goods under false pretenses.
