J. Lucas, J. R. Blake, Mrs H. H. Turner, Doct. John J. Gov, Charles J. McGwynn, Lambert S. Nor-
wood, J. Wesley Watkins, and eleven of the Jurors who tried the case, besides sundry other respect-
table citizens of Baltimore, pardoned Frederick Kreiskord, convicted in the Baltimore
City Court May Term 1848, of Murder in the second degree and sentenced to be confined
in the Penitentiary for the term of fifteen years.
