August 28th

The Governor issued his requisition directed to the Honorable David H. Burton Chief Judge of the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia for the arrest and delivery (to Peter J. Quinn Sheriff) of negroes Harry Jackson and Wellington Mudd charged on the oaths of John H. Hardisty and George F. Dealk with stealing and carrying away a wagon and two horses of the property of said John H. Hardisty of said County.

Same day the Governor approved the official Bond of Thomas Picking a servant Inspector of Flour in Baltimore City.

Same day the Governor issued his warrant for the admission of James N. Gladhill an indigent blind boy ten years of age into the Maryland Institution for the Blind for eight years from 1st April 1863.

Same day the Governor directed notice to be given to Alexander Riggaway of Caroline County of his appointment as Notary Public to reside in Goosebrough, and of the law requiring him to file his official Bond. (act 1862 chap 113.)

Same day the Governor directed notice to be published of an application for pardon in the case of Marvin Cord convicted in the Criminal Court of Baltimore City at January term 1859 of a fault with intent to kill and sentenced to the Penitentiary for eight years and seven months.

September 4th

Upon a requisition from his Excellency the Governor of Connecticut the Governor issued his warrant to the Sheriff of Baltimore City for the arrest and delivery (to David Tucker agent) of Starr Sperry charged with the crime of seduction and alleged to be a fugitive from justice now in Baltimore City.

September 8th

The Governor issued his warrant to the Sheriff of Queen Anne's County directing that an election be held on the day of the next ensuing election for Delegates for a Senator of the State of Maryland in said County (vice Samuel T. Harrison deceased)

Same day the Governor issued his warrant for the admission of Anna Lelia Campbell of Baltimore City aged ten years into the Maryland Institution for the Blind as a state beneficiary for eight years from the 1st instant.
