Sir,

In consequence of a requisition from the President of the United States in a letter from the Secretary of War, that an enquiry on oath should be made into the nature and extent of the military equipments which the French Privateer the Schooner Industry is alleged to have received in the Port of Baltimore, previous to its destined departure, which she has since departed, I take the liberty of requesting that you will as Chief
