Last fall the Legislature of Maryland granted 1500 Dollars to the Inhabitants of Savannah who had suffered by the late fire.

The Executive of Maryland immediately wrote to the Governor of Georgia and informed him of this grant and requested him to draw for the money; he acknowledged the receipt of the letter, but has never drawn. The money is still in the Treasury of Maryland.

Will you on behalf of the suffering people of Savannah point out some mode by which the money can be safely conveyed to them, and thereby the benevolent intentions of Maryland be carried into effect.

Sir,

I did not know till yesterday that your favours of the 10th and 31 of January last were in the Council Room. Speaking then on the subject of the militia I heard for the first time that the return of the first Division was made.

Although the state of our public affairs are now far changed, as to render other and more efficacious measures necessary; yet I cannot suffer the present occasion to pass without expressing the confidence and satisfaction which the zeal and patriotism manifested by so respectable a portion of the militia are calculated to inspire.
